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# Council okays lease plan for KNT

Tribal Council last week approved a request from the Kah-Nee-Ta board to proceed with a lease agreement with the new investment partner, AV Northwest.

AV Northwest will manage the resort operation and make substantial investment, perhaps \$16 million, for improvements at the property.

"Tribal Council is supportive, realizing our limited options for making Kah-Nee-Ta competitive in the Central Oregon market," said board chairman Jim Manion.

Kah-Nee-Ta had been facing the possibility of closure at the end of this year. The new agreement is the best way to make the resort again a viable enterprise, the board and Council agreed.

Facing possible closure of Kah-Nee-Ta, the board early this year reached out to AV Northwest. Through negotiation over the months the parties reached terms calling for a lease of 25 years.

During that time the management of the resort would be under AV Northwest. The tribes would receive compensation through the room tax.

The list of needed improvements at Kah-Nee-Ta, as outlined by AV Northwest, is extensive: A new heating and cooling system,

new paint, improvements to the rooms, pools, restaurant and café, to name just a few.

An intriguing aspect of the plan is a new hydro- and physical therapy center at the Kah-Nee-Ta Village. The hot springs would be put to use in the treatment of young people who are recovering from muscular and other conditions.

Construction of the Travel Plaza, a project of Indian Head Casino, began about seven months ago, with completion and grand

opening in the spring. Pictured above is the outside of the convenience store. Inside to the right will be the restaurant, and a Class II gaming room. The building is 13,500 square feet, with showers, laundry facilities, and other amenities.

# Land buy-back opportunity for members, tribes

The Department of Interior has signed the land buy-back cooperative agreement with the Con-

"The tribes look forward to working with the program to create cultural, residential, governmental and economic opportunities by consolidating fractionated lands for the benefit of our tribal community," said Council Chairman Austin Greene Jr.

"The Tribes will be better equipped to manage our lands both on and off reservation," Mr. Greene said. "Land is important to us for the continued sovereignty of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, Wasco and Paiute people."

The land buy-back program is part of the Cobell lawsuit settlement. Almost \$2 billion of the settlement went to the buy-back

program across Indian country.

Some tribes have already successfully completed the program. Randy Scott, from tribal Land Services, is the main contact person for participants in the Warm Springs buy-back.

The problem of fractionated allotment interests arose with succeeding generations after the original allottees. The heirs have inherited only percentage interests in the

land. With multiple owners, productive use or sale of the property, back to the tribes for instance, is prohibitive.

The land buy-back program gives fair market value to each individual who has an interest in an allotment, plus \$75.

The other reason to participate is that it is in the best interest of the Confederated Tribes.

# Members health survey

A team is conducting an important health survey among tribal members ages 18 and over. The survey information will help guide tribal health care priorities in the coming years. The survey team includes Warm Springs Community Health, the Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board, and Warm Springs Prevention.

The survey takes about an hour. Participants receive a \$30 gift card. Tribal Council Chairman Austin Greene Jr. explains the details of this project:

Greetings tribal members,

The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs are conducting an anonymous survey of tribal members, called Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Systems. This survey will help the tribe collect health-related information, so services and programs can be adapted to meet our needs.

The information is also vital for our grant writing efforts so we can secure funding for current and future tribal programs. We are partnering with the Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board on this project.

The Warm Springs Tribal Council approved the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Systems (BRFSS) project, and the Health and Welfare Committee approved the questions that will be asked during the survey. The project has been reviewed by the Portland Area Office Indian Health Service Institutional Review Board, and all project staff will be held to strict confidentiality when handling Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs member contact and health information

The Warm Springs BRFSS interviewers and area Indian Health Board staff will attempt to contact all tribal members over the age of 18 via telephone and doorto-door this coming fall and winter.

### LifeLine renewal change at W.S. Telecom

The Warm Springs Telecom Lifeline program offers a discounted telephone and broadband service to community members who are eligible. On the reservation about 300 customers use the Lifeline program, receiving telephone service for free. Or there is a discount for those who subscribe to a phone and Internet.

Lifeline is a federal program administered on the reservation by the Warm Springs Telecom.

During the first years of the program, the subscribers to Lifeline had to renew one time per year, everyone at the same time.

An important change this year is the change to a renewal based on the month when the person qualified and subscribed.

Telecom sent notice of this change to the subscribers, but some may not have noticed the change in renewal scheduling because

they are used the previous system, said Danica Greene, Telecom customer service manager.

The change was a federal requirement, she said. A person who misses the renewal has to go through the whole process of reapplying, involving documentation of income, residence, etc. The renewal process is much easier, Danica said.

Some customers who have missed their renewal only discovered the omission when they received their first phone or phone-Internet bill following the lapse of their Lifeline subscription.

Because of federal regulation, once there is a lapse in renewal and increase in the bill, there can be no refund, even if the person reapplies and qualifies again for Lifeline. If you have any questions, please call Danica at 541-553-0555. Or email: danica.greene@warmsprings telecom.com



Tower tour

The focus at Warm Springs Power and Water Enterprises is on clean energy, healthy rivers and healthy sustainable fish runs.

The Confederated Tribes, through Power and Water, is co-owner of the Pelton-Round Butte hydro system.

Power and Water invites the community to see firsthand the work they are doing for fisheries on the Deschutes.

These dams provide clean, renewable electricity to 150,000 homes, including those in our community, and has created revenue for us.

In addition to providing a clean energy source, Power and Water works with partners on the important stewardship responsibility: Keeping the river healthy and restore fish passage for generations to come.

One of those solutions to this issue is the Selective Water Withdrawal Tower, completed in 2010. The tower creates currents that guide young salmon and steelhead into collection facilities so they can be transported downstream around the

dams. In addition, it mixes water from the surface and bottom of Lake Billy Chinook so water released below the dams more closely matches what the water temperatures would be like if the dams weren't there.

The tower has already shown early success, with adult fish returning to the Deschutes for the first time in 50 years.

It's also worth seeing the tower and the system for yourself, to understand how it works-what it does and doesn't do—and how Power and Water is using good science to monitor this work.

The enterprise invites you to tour the facility, see how power is made, learn how the tower works and hear more about efforts to improve the health of the river. The tour is coming up toward the end of the month. To sign up, or for more information, call Power and Water at 541-553-1146.

#### Resolution of Tribal Council

#### The Languages

(The following is a recent Resolution of Tribal Council.)

Whereas the Tribal Council is the governing body of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon; and,

Whereas Ordinance 68 of pursuant to Article V Section 1(l) enacted authority for "the protections, preservation and encouragement of tribal and Indian history, culture and tradition, and found it necessary to insure the survival of the Confederated Tribes, which provides the foundation for the continuance of the Tribes as a distinct political and cultural entity perpetually adopted July 29, 1987; and

Whereas the Twenty-Seventh Tribal Council adopted Resolution 12,195 directing the entire tribal organization to support its priorities including: Cultural education and language revitalization efforts;

Whereas Kiksht, the language

of the Wasco people, Ichishkin, the language of the Ichishkin Snwit Lma (aka Warm Springs and/or Sahaptin people), and Numu, the language of the Northern Paiute people, are the heritage languages of the three tribes of the Warm Springs Indian Reservation; and,

Whereas the tribe recognizes that the languages—Kiksht, Ichiskin and Numu—are vital and deserve recognition of official traditional languages of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs; now therefore,

**Be it resolved** by the Twenty-Seventh Tribal Council of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon, pursuant to Article V Section 1(d) and (l) of the Tribal Constitution and Bylaws authorizes that the languages Kiksht, Ichiskin and Nume be declared as official traditional languages of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs Reservation of Oregon; and,

Be it further resolved that all efforts to ensure the survival of the three languages through documentation, creation of speakers, securing archival information, are essential and vital to the sovereignty and history of the tribes, that the Culture and Heritage Department will continue its efforts through grants, partnerships and development of materials and strategic plans that respect the strict control of ownership of the culture, traditions and languages of the Wasco, Ichiskin Snwit Lma and Numu people.



### Students on track for college at JCMS

What does it take to get a middle school student on track for college? It takes a special teacher like Deseray Duncan. Duncan, who teaches English Language Development at Jefferson County Middle School, also coordinates a program called AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination). AVID is an elective class for students who might be the first in their families to graduate from high school or attend college. Students with a grade point average between 2.5 and 3.5, who take the AVID class, learn specific skills that will help them prepare for success in high school, college, and careers.

"Our goal is to work with students who are traditionally underrepresented in higher education," said Duncan. "We work with them on organization, notetaking and reading strategies that will help them be successful now and in the

Duncan explained that AVID students learn the Cornell method of taking and organizing notes that is commonly used at the college level. They also spend time setting goals, reviewing progress and tracking their grade point averages to understand where they are improving and where they need extra support.

"The community building that takes place in the AVID classroom is really huge," said Duncan. "The students become an AVID family where they work as a team, help each other out and become role models. It's amazing to watch their growth and progress in the program during the year."

### JCMS students attend leadership conference in Springfield

JCMS counselor Peter Hower is always looking for ways to help middle school students develop leadership skills and a broader world view. He recently took a group of student leaders to a one day leadership conference in Springfield, Oregon, called PeaceJam Northwest.

The PeaceJam Foundation is an international organization whose mission is to create young leaders committed to positive change in themselves, their communities, and the world through the inspiration of Nobel Peace Laureates who pass on the spirit, skills, and wisdom they embody.

WEB leaders who attended the PeaceJam conference heard speakers, attended workshops and participated in discussions about how youth can tackle big issues like racism and climate change. The students listened to a talk by Ed Little Crow, a Dakota elder and long-time activist for Native American rights and civil rights in general.

T.J. Stout, grade 8, said he learned a lot about the treatment of Native Americans and what they had to go through in the past.

"They also taught us about climate change and different things that affect our society," said Stout.

Heavenly Sierra, grade 8, said she liked talking with adults about being a teen.

"We talked about the pain that some teens have and the war we face every day and how we can handle it," said Sierra. "Things like family issues, bullying, deep depression and going home to one parent or no parents at all."


One topic that 8th grader Amy Melgarejo found especially interesting was racism.

"I learned how people try to say that racism is gone, but it's still going on," said Melgarejo. "You can even see it in school by who we hang out with at

On the bus ride home, Hower and the students talked about how they can help make the culture at school more welcoming and inclusive.

"We want to make sure people don't feel left out," said Sierra.

Hower said the WEB leaders will be talking more about things they can do at school to put what they learned at the conference into action.

#### JCMS: A place where everyone belongs

Eighth grade students at Jefferson County Middle School are learning leadership skills while mentoring younger classmates as part of a program called WEB (Where Everyone Belongs). The WEB leaders buddy up with 6th graders at the beginning of the school year to show them around, answer questions and also meet with new students transferring to JCMS throughout the year. They also work with their younger classmates to help them with organization and time

"They are mostly worried about finding their classes and using the lockers," said Brook Delamarter, grade 8. "It's kinda fun because a lot of our siblings are in the 6th grade so we get to help them feel comfortable."

Connor Comingore explained that he remembers how the WEB leaders helped him get used to middle school and how important that was for him.

"I'm the first-born in my family and I didn't have older siblings to show me around when I got here," said Comingore. "It really helped me so I'm glad to be able to help the 6th graders."

The WEB program is led by JCMS counselor Peter Hower, who also finds other activities to help students to grow academically, socially and emotionally.

"One of my goals is to give kids opportunities to expand their leadership skills," said Hower.

WEB leaders will also be meeting with 5th graders to help them get used to the idea of starting middle school in September 2018.

### **Cobell Settlement 'whereabouts** unknown' deadline November 27

The Department of the Interior announced it is taking the final steps in its efforts to identify the whereabouts of approximately 17,000 Native Americans to provide compensation as part of the Cobell settlement. Some of these individuals are members of the Confederated Tribes of Warm

The settlement of the Cobell lawsuit has reached an important deadline and the Department needs Class Members, or the heirs of Class Members, to provide documentation of their status to the Office of the Special Trustee for American Indians (OST) and/or the Garden City Group (GCG), the Cobell claims administrator, by November 27, 2017, which is a court-imposed deadline for claiming settlement compensation so that payment may be made.

In 1996, Elouise Cobell, a member of the Blackfeet Tribe,

and four other Native American representatives filed a class-action lawsuit against two departments of the United States government: the Department of the Interior and the Department of the Treasury. The plaintiffs claimed that the government had incorrectly accounted for income derived from Indian trust assets, which are legally owned by the U.S. government but held in trust for individual Native Americans (the beneficial owners).

In 2009, the parties to the suit negotiated a settlement in the case, and in 2010 Congress passed implementing legislation designating \$3.4 billion for the settlement: \$1.4 billion was allocated to be paid to the plaintiffs and \$1.9 billion was allocated for a Land Buy-Back Program and a newly created educational scholarship fund for American Indian and Alaska Native students.

The settlement payment process is being handled by the GCG with the cooperation of the Interior Department. Class members

all over the country have received detailed information about their legal rights and options via the United States Postal Service. Information was also provided through an extensive media campaign which included Native America print media, social media, television and radio ads, and online advertising.

Cobell Settlement deposits that remain in WAU IIM accounts after this deadline may be involuntarily transferred to the Cobell Settlement Scholarship fund. Carl was born August 19, 1933 at Tutuilla Flats on the Umatilla Indian Reservation. His parents were John and Carrie Abraham Sampson. He was married to Marian "Arleta" Sampson for 65 years, and for the past many years were recognized as the longest married couple in the Pendleton Round-Up Indian Village.

Carl attended Pendleton High School and Chemawa Indian School.

He served for many years on

the Umatilla Tribe's Board of Trustees and as the Chairman of the General Council.

He was the Umatilla Tribe's first Tribal Housing Manager, served on the Tribal Health Commission, Portland Area Indian Health Board, Umatilla Fish and Wildlife Committee, Healing Lodge of the Seven Nations, Hanford Advisory Board, and National Congress of American Indians. He also served in the United States Air

He was a strong advocate, spokesman, and activist for protecting and honoring the Tribe's 1855 treaty with the United States, protecting Mother Earth, and promoting the Tribe's cultural pride and edu-

As a young man he fished at Celilo Falls on the Columbia River.

Over the many years, Carl and Arleta helped take care of over 30 of their grandchildren, nieces, nephews, and family members who needed their

### Fisheries, tribal advocate passes

Roy Sampsel, the first executive director of the Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission, has passed away. Mr. Sampsel was a dedicated advocate of tribes throughout Indian Country for nearly fifty years.

Mr. Sampsel was the CRITFC executive director from 1977-1979, and remained a constant figure in the organization over the following 40 years.

"Roy was a leader, but his biggest role was to never lead—his role was to prepare us to lead, support us in the lead, and make sure we accepted the responsibility to lead," said current CRITFC executive director Jaime Pinkham.

Mr. Sampsel had a life-long fascination with fish, water, forests, oceans, wildlife, and the rights of Indian tribes.

More than a fascination, he maintained a steady and creative commitment to the sovereignty of Indian nations and the protection of their natural resources.

As the first executive director of the Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission, he worked to protect, enhance and implement the tribal fishing rights of the Warm Springs, Yakama, Umatilla, and Nez Perce

He worked tirelessly convincing others that tribes have unique skills and abilities as resource managers.


