NASA rocket science at Academy

The last day of school this year at the Warm Springs Academy will be a unique one.

In the afternoon this Thursday, June 9, a team from a NASA youth education and outreach program in Washington will launch a rocket from a field by the Academy.

The rocket launch demonstration will be at the conclusion of a series of science and math exercises for middle school students.

among the school, NASA, Oregon Health Sciences University, OMSI and the University of Washington. Warm Springs Ventures also helped with some planning facilitation.

This past spring school principal Ken Parshall and middle school science teacher Paul Harris met with Juan Carlos Chavez, associate director of the Washington Space Grant Consortium.

A goal of the consortium,

represented youth to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM). A way to help achieve this is with a show-case event such as the rocket launch, he

The program has been successful at other schools in sparking the interest in STEM curriculum among younger students, Chavez added.

The NASA consortium provides resources and expert staff to facilitate the project. An initial part of the Thursday program will involve archery, and work with model rockets, concluding with the launch of the actual rocket.

The archery and other projects introduce some of the concepts that also apply to rocket science. Calculating the trajectory of an arrow, for instance, involves the same math principals that apply to rockets.

The rocket launch is scheduled for about 3:30 p.m. this Thursday.


The Navajo Nation has more than 300,000 members, and the largest Indian tribal land-base: 27,425 square miles in parts of Arizona, Utah and New Mexico.

Eel fishing at Willamette Falls

Tribal members wishing to take eels for ceremonial and subsistence purposes must be in possession of their enrollment cards to fish under claim of treaty rights.

Harvest is allowed from the start of the flashboard installment by PGE until July 31.

Flashboards installment is expected to begin this week, and to be complete by June 16.

Please do not fish below the construction workers in the interest of safety.

Harvest is limited to the east side of Willamette Falls by hand or with hand powered tools.

Harvest will be open on Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday of each week. Fishing hours are sunrise to sunset. This is a subsistence fishery as described by Tribal Code 340.100.

Branch of Natural Resources staff will monitor and enforce the fishery. Harvesters must allow BNR staff to examine their catch.

Tribal response to oil transport spill

An oil train derailment by the Columbia River has brought into clearer focus an issue the tribes have been warning about for years.

"It was not a matter of if, but when," said Warm Springs Tribal Council

Chairman Austin Greene. oi, Bakken, spilled from cars "It's been a disaster waiting to happen."

Chairman Greene earlier this week visited the site where the train derailment happened, at Mosier on the Columbia. A volatile type of

that went off the rails. This sparked a fire, and oil that seeped into the Mosier water system, threatening the Columbia. This is an obvious threat to the tribes' treaty fishing rights at the river.

The Confederated Tribes for three years now have been saying a spill such, or worse, is inevitable. Other river tribes also voiced their concern about the on-going problem of oil and coal transport by rail along the river.

The estate planning service is a program of the Institute for Indian Estate Planning and Probate at Seattle University School of Law.

past decade in Warm Springs.

During that time, many tribal members have used the service.

Izenson is working with a supervising attorney to provide the estate planning services to tribal members. She met with Tribal Council earlier this week, explaining the services that are being provided.

The director of the Office of the Special Trustee, Charles Jackson, helps facilitate the program.

Importance of planning

Especially for tribal members, having a will is recommended for anyone over 18.

And this is especially recommended for people who have ownership interest in land: If you die without a will, the American Indian Probate Reform Act will determine who will receive your trust land.

Services available this summer include writing a new will, or changing an existing one. The new or changed will would be drafted so as to

comply with tribal, state and federal law.

You need a will if:

You are over 18;You have, or may acquire, trust land, non-trust

land, or personal property;

· You have children or step-children under 18;

You want to leave property to someone who is not in your immediate, blood

·You want to stop further fractionation of your land

If you die without a will, the American Indian Probate Reform Act will determine who will receive your trust land, but with a will you have many more options.

Yakama publish Climate Adaptation Plan

Climate change is real and, unfortunately, the effects appear to be in motion. We are witnessing changes in the seasons. Our roots and berries must be gathered sooner, and salmon returns are less predictable. Our people notice less snow in the mountains now, and there is less cool water during the summer when it was once abundant. The changes we see may not bode well for our future. Over the years to come, we may lose natural resources that are important to our culture and our heritage. Some of these losses may be irreversible.

— Introduction to Cli-

mate Adaptation Plan for the Territories of the Yakama Nation

Published last month, the Yakama Nation Climate Adaptation Plan for the Territories of the Yakama Nation states:

This document is an acknowledgment that climate change is real and that it poses a threat to our grandchildren, our culture, and our way of living.

This document represents the first collective effort by our many governmental departments and programs to identify important resources and cultural components most likely to be impacted by climate change.

The plan identifies work the tribe is currently undertaking recognizing and helping to reduce climate change impacts.

The plan includes specific recommendations for deeper analyses of vulnerabilities and risks to the most important interests and adaptation actions that we should implement now.

This is a starting point for

the conversation about climate change and planning for adaptation throughout all of the territories of the Yakama Nation.

It is derived from the experience of the Yakama Nation people, its tribal programs, and findings from regional experts on these important topics. "This document is one way we can educate ourselves about current vulnerabilities and future risks and share ideas about actions that we may need to take to build climate resilience."

Oregon Zoo condor egg is called to the wild

Five chicks have hatched since March—with one more still on the way—from eggs laid this winter at the Oregon Zoo's Jonsson Center for Wildlife Conservation. In a fitting salute to the recovery program's goal to facilitate a self-sustaining population of North America's largest land birds,

one of these chicks went straight to the California wild.

In late April, Joe Burnett, condor program coordinator at the Ventana Wildlife Society, noticed that a pair of wild birds—Condor No. 310 and her mate, No. 219—had an egg that was past its expected hatch date.

Burnett decided to check out the nest cave, rappelling halfway down a 180-foot cliff in the steep coastal mountain range near Big Sur. After closer examination of the egg, he candled the egg and determined it had failed inside. While unfortunate, natural egg failures like this do occur, Burnett says, and

the California condor recovery network is there to pick up the slack.

At the Oregon Zoo's Jonsson Center, timing was spot on. Inside of Egg No. 7, laid at the Center on March 4, a chick was already "pipping"—chiseling a hole in its shell to access more air.

Nakomis is an active nine-year-old. He enjoys hunting, fishing, picking berries, digging roots and attending Warm Springs community events, ceremonies and celebrations.

In his young life he has become quite familiar with Sahaptin words. He has a great sense of humor in him with a love for life and laughter. He continues to build a strong connection with his friends and relatives here on the reservation.

Thank you for voting for your relative Nakomis, and please vote for all the other relatives on the list, they are our future!

My name is Lea Sally Littleleaf Kirk. I am the daughter of Charles Littleleaf Kirk, granddaughter of Lolita Greeley and great granddaughter of James Greeley and Merle Scott. Some of my bloodline aunties and uncles are Roberta Kirk, Olivia Wallulatum, Radine Billy, Maria Godines, Tony Kirk and Elton Greeley.

Becoming a tribal member would give me a chance to learn from, and re-establish bonds with my Native culture and family. I would like to feel more connected to tradition, to understand who I come from, and share who I have become with my family. I would like to feel welcome on tribal land, contribute to community and protect the legacy of our elders and what they can pass on to us in knowledge of our language and culture.

I am 26 years old and grew up in Portland. For the past ten years I have pursued and completed apprenticeships in different art mediums such as iron forge work, graphic design, clay sculpture, glass artistry and bicycle fabrication. I have presented my art in the Portland art community galleries, national trade shows and online.





I love fancy shawl dancing and being a good role model for my daughter and younger siblings.



I've started a few businesses here in Warm Springs. My current business is a fishing guide service I share with my wife Alysia Aguilar, who is also a tribal member.



The free admission program is available to any bearer of a Geneva Convention Common Access Card (CAC), a DD Form 1173 ID Card (Dependent ID), or a DD Form 1173-1 ID Card, which includes active duty military-Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard, the National Guard and Reserve as well as U.S Public Health Service Commissioned Corps, NOAA Commissioned Corps, and up to five family members.

If your spouse is deployed, you may visit the museum. If your spouse is not deployed but can't visit,

you may still visit the museum through the Blue Star program. Just bring one of the required Identification cards listed




