## Tribal Council reviews situation with Kah-Nee-Ta

The Kah-Nee-Ta board and management recently met with a potential business partner, as the resort board is hoping to find an investment and possible operating partner.

No agreement was reached with the prospective partner, but the meeting was positive and the person was impressed with the property, the board reported at Tribal Council this week.

On another positive note, the Memorial Day Weekend saw an increase in resort revenue compared to last year, said Marie Kay Williams, Kah-Nee-Ta interim manager.

The junction, or general manager's house has been renovated, and rented out during the eclipse for \$10,000, Ms. Williams reported. The house can now become part of the regular room inventory at the resort, she said.

There is a possibility in the future of partnering with Mt. Hood Meadows on developing a mountain biking feature at Kah-Nee-Ta, Williams said.

There are 97 tribal member employees at the resort; seven MITs; 14 other Indians; and 45 non-Indians, she reported. Meanwhile Kah-Nee-Ta is still hiring for the summer season.

Tribal Council late last year approved a \$400,000 loan to Kah-Nee-Ta, using the Business Investment Revolving Fund as supplemented by the state gas tax refund. This transaction was needed in order to avoid seeing the resort fall into receivership. Council is now regularly reviewing the progress at Kah-Nee-Ta, as late July is a time when some long-term decision may be needed. Some other items from this week's meeting:

Brent Moschetti is doing a great job managing and improving the Kah-Nee-Ta Golf Course, said Warm Springs Chief Delvis Heath.

Moschetti is a long-time member of Kah-Nee-Ta golf, and offered to run the course when he learned the resort was thinking of shutting down the operation.

### UAS center

Councilman Lee Tom asked about the unmanned vehicle systems Center for Excellence that will be housed at the resort.

The project is nearly complete, and will be a significant draw for Kah-Nee-Ta. The center will have drone flight-simulation computers and software, plus access to the nearby tribal UAS test sites.

Warm Springs Ventures and Construction have made great

progress on the space that will house the center. "It looks incredible. It really turned out beautifully," said Aurolyn Stwyer, Ventures marketing director.

The remodeling work was done through an Oregon infrastructure grant. Additional funding is now expected to help with the final components, such as furniture and computer, Ms. Stwyer said.

Since last fall Kah-Nee-Ta has been a separate enterprise from Indian Head Casino. This transition has been difficult, said Councilman Raymond Tsumpti, but it was a change the membership wanted to see.

Councilwoman Brigitte McConville commended the Kah-Nee-Ta board members for serving without compensation.

## Legal action possible for start of County Line 2 fire

In the summer of 2015 the County Line 2 fire burned across almost 70,000 acres of reservation land. More than 600 fire personnel were involved in the suppression effort.

This was a costly event for the tribes, in terms of land that was

burned, and the cost of combating the blaze. Many homes were also threatened, with the Red Cross shelter housing up to 30 people.

Tribal Council recently authorized the pursuit of legal action against the person or persons responsible.

The County Line 2 fire began as a series of brush fires along Highway 26. These then combined to form the one large wildfire.

The brush fires started as a person drove on the highway, towing a trailer or motor home. Part of the rig was dragging on the high-

way, or had a defective wheel. This caused sparks, according to the investigation and reports at the time. A lawsuit for damages from the County Line 2 fire could be filed in Tribal Court, or in U.S. District Court, according to the Council resolution.

## Youth teams plan for eclipse

The state transportation department is estimating that a million visitors will be in Oregon for the August 21 solar eclipse.

As many as 100,000 visitors are expected in the immediate region of Warm Springs and Madras, where the totality of the eclipse will be seen. In other words the crowds will be bigger than anything experienced before in the region.

The Confederated Tribes, the enterprises and Warm Springs Academy have special events planned for the eclipse, and during the Saturday and Sunday leading up to that Monday morning.

Indian Head Casino has a week-end of music from national-level artists, featuring Kelly Jackson, Arlie Neskahe and Charles Littleleaf. The Museum at Warm Springs will host the Artists Village, featuring the works of Native American artisans such as Lillian Pitt and Mr. Littleleaf, among other local artisans.

Activities around the reservation—vendor stations and camping, for instance—are also part of the reservation plans. Public safety will be a big factor, as mid to late August is the height of the fire season, not to mention the traffic concerns.

### From the Edge of Space

During the eclipse, teams of students from Idaho, Washington, Warm Springs and other parts of Oregon will work with the Space Grant Consortium, based in Montana, on the launching of helium balloons equipped with special cameras.

The balloons ascend to the very edge of space, where they will video record the eclipse from this unique perspective. The program is in partnership with NASA.

The Warm Springs student teams will be among several in the U.S. that are participating in the eclipse balloon project. About half a dozen balloons will launch from Warm Springs and Madras. Across the entire path of the eclipse to the Atlantic Coast, students will launch about 70 high-altitude balloons to view the eclipse.

The balloons eventually deflate, and then fall back to earth, where the cameras can be retrieved.

In Warm Springs the students will arrive at the Warm Springs Academy on the Sunday before the eclipse. They'll camp there, and then launch the balloons the following morning. The eclipse will happen in Warm Springs shortly before 10:20 a.m.

Air traffic is expected to be very heavy on the morning of the eclipse. The helium balloons, though, will be high above the regular aircraft space, and safety precautions are a priority. The August 21 total solar eclipse will last about two minutes and two seconds in Central Oregon skies.

## Council to consider board candidates

Tribal Council is looking to fill a number of enterprise board of director positions: **Warm Springs Composite Products** Board of Directors: two non-member positions. Class II ending December 31, 2018; and Class III ending December 31, 2019. **Warm Springs Power and Water** Enterprise Board of Directors: one non-member position, Class II term expiring January 1, 2018. For this board the preference is for individuals with some expertise in the field of energy—water, wind or related. To promote the development and utilization of power resources of the reservation for the benefit of the members of the Confederated Tribes, the state of Oregon, the Pacific Northwest and the nation. **Warm Springs Tribal Employment Rights Office** Commission: two positions, terms expiring January 11, 2018.

Regarding the Warm Springs TERO: The TERO commission is responsible for conducting hearings on tribal employment rights matters in accordance with the TERO code. Review contractor applications to certify the applicant is eligible for inclusion in the Indian-owned business directory. Certify on-the-job training hours as recorded by office staff for tribal apprenticeship programs. The commission may conduct on-site visits if such visits are a part their investigation for decision-making for appeals. Develop procedures to implement the provisions of the TERO code. **Warm Springs Tribal Credit** Board of Directors: one non-member position Class II, term expires January 1, 2020. The other Class II board member is a tribal member. The position requires a candidate who is interested in the social and economic development of

the Confederated Tribes, and who has expertise in the field of credit or related professions. Have a reputation for industry, dependability, honesty and integrity. An on-going requirement is the board member have no loan with the Confederated Tribes that is in delinquent status. ## Approval to seek grants for downtown campus work

A long-standing infrastructure project facing the Confederated Tribes is the downtown campus. This is a potential economic development area for the tribes, but the underground water and sewer lines are obsolete. New business cannot develop there without some significant work on the infrastructure. Tribal Council, through recent resolution, approved the pursuit of grant funding to carry out this project. The resolution notes that the tribes over the years have developed two detailed plans for the future of the campus area. The first was the 2005 Downtown Campus Development Plan, and the follow-up was the 2012 Warm Springs Town Center Property Summary. Both of the plans say

the “next steps” in the downtown improvement should be carried out “as soon as possible, because of the failing infrastructure systems. They also note “the desire to establish an economic business environment that when completed shall provide numerous employment opportunities for businesses and tribal members.” And both of the planning documents recommend working with federal and state grant funding programs that will assist the tribes to take these next steps. Planning and other tribal staff have identified potential funding sources, prompting the recent Tribal Council resolution approving the development of grant applications.

## Grant helps W.S. Boys & Girls Club

The Warm Springs Boys & Girls Club received a grant in the amount of \$18,500 from the Oregon Community Foundation. The funding will support the Triple Play-Healthy Habits program at the club, promoting nutrition and physical fitness among the youth of Warm Springs. Also in Jefferson County,

the Madras Aquatic Center received a \$20,000 grant for a community playground structure and sand pit, promoting healthy, active and outdoor lifestyles for the kids. These were part of \$365,000 in Oregon Community Foundation grants in Central Oregon, part of the statewide \$8.9 million in grants.

## Farming loan program adds commodities

The Farm Services Facility Loan program now covers alfalfa seed, clover seed, grass seed and pears. This applies in Oregon, including the reservation. The program provides low-interest financing so producers can build or upgrade facilities to store commodities. Pinky Beymer, member of the Central Oregon Farm Service Agency County Committee, shares this information as an encouragement

to producers on the reservation. Through the loan program, drying and handling and storage equipment are also eligible, including storage and handling trucks. Eligible facilities and equipment may be new or used, permanently affixed or portable. Loan terms vary from 3 to 12 years. For more information please contact the local FSA office, 541-923-4693.

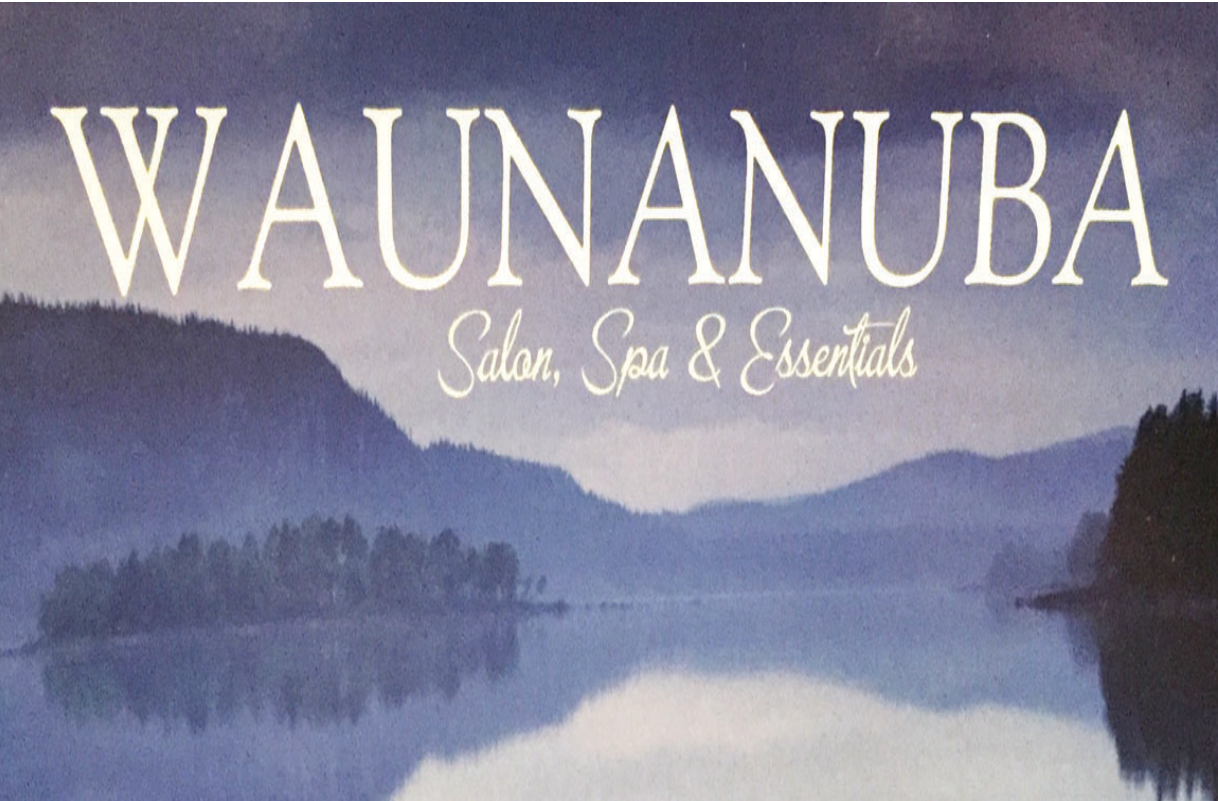

The Warm Springs tribes have long supported the local media outlet, and in 2004 KWSO became part of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting Community Service Grant program, which now funds close to 50 percent of the station's operations annually.

"We have always been so fortunate to have budget support, so we never ventured into some of the typical fundraising models of mainstream public radio entities," says KWSO station manager Sue Matters.

"But now with our

tribal funding reduced, and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting in jeopardy at the federal level, it's time for us to press harder on bringing in new revenue streams."

The KWSO Solar Eclipse Pledge Drive will include on air and online appeals to purchase a KWSO membership.

For a membership there is a one-time annual fee of \$35. You can also choose a sustaining membership, and give a specific amount of money monthly, having it automatically drawn from your bank account or credit card.

The August pledge drive will be a chance for the community, as well as visitors to Central Oregon, to show their appreciation and support for Warm Springs Community Radio.
