Tribal Council voted last week to continue the Warm Springs Timber Co. beyond the current year.

Council early this year approved the enterprise to operate through 2017. The vote last week allows the company to continue as long as the Council sees positive results. from the operation.

Tribes prepare as eclipse is fast approaching

The total solar eclipse will be a tions Officer Alyssa Macy: once in a lifetime experience for most people.

For this reason tens of thousands of people will be arriving in the area the weekend before and on Monday, August 21.

The Native Sol Solar Fest, the NASA balloon launch and other science activities at the Academy are part of the festivities. Indian Head Casino and the Museum at Warm Springs are planning special events for the occasion.

With the influx of visitors comes concern for public safety, including fire safety, roadway access, and possible trespass on restricted areas of the reservation.

The tribes' planning team met this week at Fire Management, discussing the precautions that the tribes can take in preparation for the eclipse.

On hand were tribal management, Warm Springs Fire and Safety, Fire Management, the Police Department, BIA, and the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office. (Look in the August 16 Spilyay for details on the public safety plans for the reservation.)

The national TERO convention began 40 years ago, with the first convention held at Kah-Nee-Ta.

The convention returns to the reservation as the Warm Springs TERO is now established. For this reason the theme of convention was 'Back Where It All Began.'

The 2017 event started on Sunday with golf at the resort. The convention concludes this Thursday, August 3.

A keynote speaker was Brian Cladoosby, president of the National Congress of the American Indian. The co-founders of the Council for Tribal Employment Rights, and the current CTER general counsel were also among the speakers.

Event organizers will provide free solar eclipse glasses, solar eclipse viewing telescopes, opportunities to take a photo of the Sun, potential live streaming from balloon flights and opportunities to explore the solar system.

Experts will be on site to answer questions.

The balloons will ascend to the edge of outer space. Equipped with cameras, they will be able to photograph the event, relaying the pictures back to the team on the ground.

NASA will then try to retrieve the balloons when they come back to earth.

Carrying on the sport of saddle bronc riding

Joe Scott III is among the best young saddle bronc riders in the state.

This summer he won the Oregon High School Rodeo Association saddle bronc competition at Prineville, qualifying for the National High School Championships in Wyoming.

Joe just finished his junior year of high school, giving him a great chance to repeat as the state high school champion in his senior year.

Joe III comes from a family of saddle bronc riders, carrying on the tradition established by his dad Joe Jr. and grandfather Joe Sr.

When he first started out in the sport, Joe III had to overcome an important saddle bronc challenge.

"My dad stayed on his first horse, and my grandpa stayed on his eighth horse," Joe says.

"It took me 20 horses before I even stayed on one. That was challenging, to keep persevering, waiting for that right moment when I stayed on one."

After that it was different. The feeling of accomplishment inspired him to work hard at the sport. These days he even competes with his dad at saddle bronc.

Joe's training mostly includes running, and riding the dummy saddle bronc. Asked what advice he might have for young people interested in bronc riding, Joe III says:

"You've got to prepare yourself for a lot of buck offs. I've been bucked off more than I've stayed on. You have to be level headed, and find someone to teach you how to do it right. And then get a saddle."

The many healthy benefits of reading for young people

Parents want the best for their children, and a great way to help your child is to encourage him or her to read.

Reading to your child can gift them with a higher ability for learning in general. And they are more likely to do well in school.

After all, if a student is struggling to put together words and sentences, how can they be expected to learn the math, science and social concepts they'll be expected to learn when they begin elementary school?

A love of reading can slash stress levels, encourages positive thinking, and improves basic speech skills. Reading improves thinking and concentration.

Snuggling up with a book lets you and your busy

child slow down and recapture that sweet cuddly time when they were a baby, not as a chore but a nurturing activity that will bring you closer together.

Many benefits Here are some more posi-

tive benefits:

Researchers estimate that we learn 5 to 15 percent of all the words we know are through reading.

This is particularly important for children, whose vocabulary size is directly and dramatically related to the books they read.

Reading improves concentration and discipline:

Along with reading comprehension comes a stronger self-discipline, longer attention span, and better memory retention, all of which will help your child when they enter school.

Reading improves

empathy: Getting wrapped up in the lives of characters strengthens your ability to understand others' feelings, and strengthens friendships and a sense of belonging.

Reading encourages life goals: Reading about someone who overcame obstacles may motivate you to meet your own goals.

The more you identify with a character and experience the events as if they were happening to you, the more likely you'll be to take positive action.

Reading can melt away stress and brighten your day, keeping your brain young.

Another recent study found that older adults who regularly read or play mentally challenging games like chess or puzzles are two and a half times less likely to develop Alzheimer's disease.

Reading is fun and can help you save cash. Kids who are exposed to reading are much more likely to choose books over video games, television and other forms of entertainment as they grow older.

The average novel costs between \$8 and \$15 (paperback) and takes about six hours to read. Compare that to going to see a few movies, spending a day at an amusement park or eating a few meals out. Reading is a much more cost-effective splurge for your entertainment dollars. And free from your local Library!

Books have the power to benefit children in many ways. As a parent, reading to your children is one of the most important things you can do to prepare them with a foundation for academic excellence.

The services are provided to adults 60 years and older with preference to those in greatest social and economic need, with particular attention to low income, minority and frail individuals.


To schedule an appointment and to get more information, call Louise Muir at 541-475-1148. The following list of priority services will be offered to seniors:

Fisheries seasons open

Commercial platform and hook and line sales opened on Tuesday, August 1, and will continue until 6 p.m. on Tuesday, October 31. The open area is all of Zone 6.

Salmon, steelhead, shad, walleye, catfish, bass, carp and yellow perch may be sold or kept for subsistence use.

Sturgeon

Legal-size sturgeon are between 43 and 54 inches fork length in The Dalles and John Day pools; and between 38 and 54 inches fork length in the Bonneville Pool.

These may be kept for subsistence use, or sold during the

open commercial set line season of that started August 1 and goes till 6 p.m. on Saturday, August 12 in the John Day Pool only. The other pools are subsistence use only for sturgeon.

Allowed gear are hoop nets, dip nets and hook and line. Dam closed areas applicable to platform gear and hook and line are in effect. Fish may be sold after the period ends if caught during the open period.

You can reach the Warm Springs Fisheries Department at 541-553-3557. The office is located at the Natural Resources complex at the industrial park, 4205 Upper Dry Creek Road.

Important Notice to Tribal Member Hunters

(The following information is provided by the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs Branch of Natural Resources.)

To the hunters in the listed:

Every tribal member hunter who was issued a 2016 deer, elk, cougar, bear, pronghorn or specialty tag needs to complete required information for the Branch of Natural Resources. If you forgot to provide this information, it is important to do so:

Any hunter who fails to report 2016 deer and elk, will not be able to be issued any 2017 season tags, and hunting and fishing rights may be suspended by the Fish and Wildlife Committee.

By completing the mandatory hunter report, you are providing key pieces of information that biologists will use in their game management actions.

Biologists look at harvest, hunting pressure, and the number of people who got a tag but didn't hunt when they set regulations. This data helps biologists identify key management objectives when setting season dates and tag allocation for specific units and areas.

Your report supports the agency's goal to sustain the cultural, subsistence, and recreational needs of tribal members in perpetuity.

Additionally, penalties for not reporting are being considered by Branch of Natural Resources and the Fish and Wildlife Committee. This may include paying for tags if reporting standards are not met.

Ways to report

There are a number of ways to report this essential information:

- 1. Completely fill out the bottom section of the tag issued to you, even if you didn't hunt or weren't successful: Information from hunters who did not hunt or did not harvest an animal is as important as from those who did take an animal. Bring the completed tag to Natural Resources.
- 2. Call 541-553-2002 and speak with a Branch of Natural Resources secretary or Wildlife Department staff member who will take your information.
- 3. In person reporting can be made at the Branch of Natural Resources office.
- 4. You can mail in tags to: Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs Branch of Natural Resources: Wildlife Dept. P.O. BOX C, Warm Springs, OR 97761.

CRITFC welcomes new chairman

Nez Perce leader Casey Mitchell is the chairman of the Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission.

Mr. Mitchell was elected to the position by his peers from the Warm Springs, Yakama, Nez Perce, and Umatilla tribes.

At 38, he is one of the youngest individuals ever to chair the four-tribe commission. He assumes the position from Leland Bill, a Tribal Council member from the Yakama Nation.

Mr. Mitchell is the Secretary of the Nez Perce Tribal Executive Committee, the tribe's governing body.

He has spent the past twenty years serving his tribe and community, focusing his efforts on tribal treaty rights and natural resources issues.

He received a Bachelor's degree in Environmental Science from Northwest Indian College in Bellingham, Wash., afterward teaching Ecology there.

He then returned to the Nez Perce Reservation, working for the tribe's fisheries program as a biologist in the Watershed, Harvest, and Production divisions, specifically working on fisheries management issues throughout the Columbia River Basin.

"Indian Country is looking at some challenging times ahead," Mr. Mitchell said

"But let us not be afraid. As a united front we are strong, confident, and ready to uphold our inherent sovereignty and tribal treaty rights. Through the common ground that we all share, we will work to protect the rights that we were given, and to preserve the land, water, and resources for everyone in the region."

Jaime A. Pinkham, CRITFC executive director, welcomes the new chairman. "CRITFC is thankful for

the leadership of the Yakama Nation over the past year," Mr. Pinkham said.

"The tribes have waded into key battles against reckless coal and oil transportation projects, and secured important advancements of housing for tribal members living along the Columbia River, to name a few."

Retiring CRITFC chairman Leland Bill commented:

"As tribal leaders we come together to restore fisheries populations throughout the Columbia River system, and to educate others about the tribes and our work.

"It has been a tremendous honor to serve the commission and the four treaty tribes. The commission is in great hands with Chairman Mitchell, and I look forward to working with him as the four tribes continue our fight for tribal sovereignty, tribal treaty rights, and the fish populations that sustain our communities."

The other CRITFC officers elected are Ryan Smith of Warm Springs, vice-chairman; Jeremy Red Star Wolf, Umatilla, secretary; and Leland Bill, Yakama, treasurer.

The election of CRITFC officers takes place every June with the seats rotated among the four member tribes beginning in July.

A conversation about diabetes

(The following is a conversation with Montell Elliott, Diabetes Coordinator at the clinic, provided by the Warm Springs Model Diabetes program.)

Question: How long have you worked in Warm Springs and with the Diabetes Management team?

Answer: I have been at Warm Springs Health and Wellness Center for 23 years, diabetes prevention 13 and diabetes program just over a year.

Question: What motivated you to join the Diabetes Program?

Answer: I have enjoyed working with people with prediabetes, and learned that what we all want is to prevent the complications of diabetes.

If your blood sugar is high, then it causes the bad things that we call complications, like amputations, eye sight problems or nerve pain.

Even if you are considered to have 'normal' blood sugar now, we are all at greater risk of getting diabetes by being Native American, and most of us have family with diabetes. (If you are curious, I am Alaska Native and a member of the Tlinget and Haida Tribe.)

I actually joined the Diabetes Prevention Program partially to learn how to prevent diabetes for myself. I had gestational diabetes while I was pregnant and had to take insulin. The program has helped me prevent diabetes so far in my own life.

In my job, I have also found enjoyment in being an administrator. I enjoy working with employees toward goals of making better programs for patient care. I have been the acting Diabetes Coordinator since February 2016 and the Diabetes Pre-

vention Coordinator for about six years.

Before that I was the recruitment coordinator for the Diabetes Prevention Program. My role as diabetes coordinator is now official and I am part of the executive team at Warm Springs Health and Wellness Center

In my time off I enjoy being with my family. I am also a Netflix addict and enjoy reading.

Question: What do you think is most important for patients to do for their own health?

Answer: Admit to yourself when something is not right in your body and seek help. Denial is a sneaky thing, and until you admit you have a problem, you cannot do anything about it.

Question: What is your favorite part of your job?

My favorite part of my job is health coaching because I really like to work with people one on one to make a plan towards health.

Question: Why do you think management of diabetes is important?

If you can manage your diabetes then you can live longer, healthier and happier. I think that is what we all want.

There were five persons, five brothers. They were the Wolves. They ran all over the country, every day hunting. Coyote watched them all the time. He ate with them, ate what they brought from their hunting: deer meat, elk, all kinds of meat.

Every evening the Wolves talked about seeing something in the sky. One evening Coyote asked the oldest Wolf brother, "What do you talk about? What is it you see in the sky?" The Wolf would not tell. The old Wolf was sly, always afraid. Wise with years, the old wolf of today is hard to trap.

The next evening Coyote asked the next oldest Wolf brother the same question. The Wolf would not answer

The next evening Coyote asked the third oldest Wolf what it was that they talked about, what it was they saw in the sky. The Wolf would

not tell him.

The next evening the Coyote asked the fourth Wolf brother the same question. The fourth Wolf said to Coyote, "Maybe if I tell you, you would tell my brothers. They would be mad at me."

One morning the five brothers all got together. The fourth Wolf spoke, "Coyote asked me what we are talking about, what it is that we see in the sky. I said to Coyote, 'Maybe if I tell you, you will tell my brothers. They would be mad at me.' What do you think? Are we going to tell him what we see in the sky?"

The Wolves had one little Dog. The youngest Wolf said, "We will go tell Coyote what he asks about. We can do nothing with them. They are way up in the sky, those two things. What do you think, my brothers? Will we tell Coyote?"

The brothers answered, "Yes! We will tell Coyote all about it." The Wolves were all satisfied to tell Coyote.

One day Coyote came in and they said, "We saw two animals in the sky. We do not know how we can get at them. They are away up

Coyote said, "All right! We will go see! We will go up and

The youngest Wolf asked, "How will we go up?"

Coyote answered him, "It is well. I will show you how we can go up without trouble."

It was the middle of wintertime. Coyote got five quivers filled with arrows. He shot one arrow towards the sky. The arrow struck the sky, stuck there. Coyote shot a second arrow. It stuck the end of the first arrow, struck the end and held fast. Coyote shot all of his arrows. They reached the ground, a shaft from the sky to the

Coyote had cut rings (spirals) around the arrow shafts so he and the Wolves could hold tightly with their hands. The oldest Wolf always carried the Dog. There were no stars in the sky at the time.

The next sun they all went up the arrow-way. Covote went first, followed by the five brother Wolves. Many suns, many nights they climbed. They all arrived at the sky, reached there safely. They saw these two animals plainly. They were Grizzly Bears! Coyote said to the Wolves, "No one go near them! They will tear you to pieces."

The two youngest Wolves went up close. They were not afraid. The two next youngest Wolves followed. Oldest Wolf stayed behind with the Dog. He was always behind, always careful, always afraid.

The youngest went up closer. The Grizzlies did not get mad at them. They all stood there just like a good

Coyote stood back. He looked at them. All was a picture to him. Covote smiled. He walked about looking. He was thinking about it, thinking what he would do. He thought, "I am going to picture this for the different people who are to come. They will look at it. They will think, 'There is a story about it."

Coyote pictured them there. He made they stay there in the sky, five Wolves and a Dog. The two Grizzly Bears had always been there.

When Coyote came down, he took the arrows from the sky, took it away. When he had passed the second arrow, he took it off and so on till he came to the ground. The Wolves could not come down. When nighttime came, Coyote went out and looked at the nice picture in the sky. There they

were: two Grizzlies, five Wolves and a little Dog.

Coyote said to the bird Whoch-whoch, "Maybe I will die! You tell the new people what I have done. Pretty soon there will be many stars growing in the sky. It is my work."

Whoch-whoch got the story from Coyote to tell to us. From this sun, now we know. You see this bird Whoch-whoch, when he flies up singing. He is telling you this story, how Coyote pictured the sky. It is good to know the Whoch-whoch. From them, the Grizzlies and the Wolves, came the stars, as Coyote pictured

Coyote came this way from the sunrise. He traveled a long distance to this country. One night he looked up and saw many young stars. They were pretty thick, all growing rapidly.

In the meantime he had made Whoch-whoch to tell it all everywhere, scatter all around the news of what he had done. He asked Whochwhoch, "What is wrong with those stars up there? Too many of them."

Whoch-whoch answered, "Oh! Those are stars growing full in the sky. They are growing fast. If they grow pretty full in the sky, they may fall down. This earth will become all frost."

Coyote got scared about his work! Coyote took (made up) his mind, "I will go up again! That is my work! I will go up again"

Coyote took his five quivers of arrows. He shot them upwards, making a trail as before. He climbed again to the sky. He rounded up the stars, like war parties in camp, all different places. You see sometimes stars pointed together, maybe squares. That was Coyote's work. He placed them that

The big white road across the sky, Covote made that trail. Coyote said to the stars, "You must not grow too fast. You must keep together! If you want to go somewhere, fly as the lightening, speed like the light! You do that! Never grow too fast!"

Coyote put up a knife of stars. Watch that! Coyote put up a bunch of stars. Watch them! Sometimes this bunch comes up in the evening over the mountain as trails the sun. These stars give luck when the bow-and-arrowwoods are in bloom. This luck is for gambling, horse racing, or anything you may

The documentary focuses on inspiring Native youth, encouraging sports programs and understanding the link to positive physical and mental












