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School year 2018-19 begins at Academy

The beginning of fall is among the best times of year, for the weather, sports, school, etc. This fall 645 students are starting their new school at the Warm Springs Academy.

Outside the Academy classrooms, there are football practice and games, volleyball tournaments and cross country.

Meanwhile for the 509-J school district the board of directors at their meeting this week accepted more than \$1 million in grants.

Some of the money will be used for after-school education programs, the hiring of one new teacher, and teacher training.

Some of the grant money—through the Oregon Workforce Housing Initiative—will go to Warm Springs Teachers' Row.

There are currently eight houses on the row, owned by the school district and built in the 1950s.

The Housing Initiative grant will

allow the district to rehabilitate and remodel five of the eight homes.

The remodel will include new flooring, cupboards and other

changes.

The school district will also add two modular homes to Teachers' Row.

Members will see three tribal ballots next year

The membership will vote on three important tribal matters in 2019. There will be two ballots regarding enrollment—a baseline question, and an adoption election—plus the election of the Twenty-Eighth Tribal Council.

The first tribal vote in 2019 will be on February 15, asking the membership to decide on a possible change to the how blood quantum is determined

for the purposes of automatic enrollment. Absentee ballots for this election will likely go out in December.

Specifically, the February ballot will ask: "Should Resolution 12,157 determining the blood quantum for the purpose of automatic enrollment be approved?"

The Twenty-Sixth Tribal Council passed Resolution 12,157, with the Simnasho District then invoking Article VI of the Tribal Constitution, requiring the matter be put to referendum. The current Tribal Council then set the referendum date for February next year.

In the spring of 2019 the mem-

bership will vote on the next Tribal Council, with the district nomination meetings coming this winter.

Then next late summer or fall is the projected time for an adoption election. The last successful adoption election was in 1996.

Enrollment baseline

Tribal management developed the following explanation regarding the enrollment matters:

Warm Springs Enrollment Ordinance 94 outlines the requirements for automatic enrollment and adoption. Currently, an individual is eligible for automatic enrollment if they have at least one-

quarter of Confederated Tribes blood: Warm Springs, Wasco or Paiute.

Tribal Council in 2008 adopted Resolution 10,934 allowing individuals to also consider blood quantum from neighboring tribes based upon valid traditional kinship and ancestral ties that can be documented and confirmed as traceable to legitimate treaty and pre-treaty family affiliation connected to the Warm Springs (Sahaptin or Ichiskin); Wasco, (Chinookan or Kiksht); and/or Paiute, (Shoshonean or Numu).

Natural Resources monitoring wolf pups

Wildlife officials at the Branch of Natural Resources have known for the past couple of years that wolves are living on the reservation. Images of the animals were caught on remote cameras.

What has not been clear is whether the wolves were just passing through the reservation, or were they living here permanently, said Austin Smith Jr., BNR wildlife biologist.

This summer has seen a fasci-

nating development in the Warm Springs wolf story: An alfa male and alfa female wolf pair are now raising two wolf pups on the reservation.

Austin has seen them many times, and has pictures of the adults and the pups. The young ones are about five months old, he said.

Wolves were re-introduced in Idaho about 20 years ago, and apparently some have migrated to

Oregon, including to the reservation.

Wolves are at the top of the wildlife food chain, taking deer and elk and other animals. They evolved as an endurance species, able to follow their prey for long periods of time until the stragglers can no longer get away.

In this way, by taking the weaker prey, wolves help make a healthier deer and elk population, Austin said.

Wolves are smart, hunting cooperatively in teams. The male wolf can weigh up to 99 pounds, and the females up to about 85 pounds.

The two wolf pups on the reservation weigh about 45 to 55 pounds, Austin said. They can live for up to 16 years.

Wolves are protected by the federal Endangered Species Act.

A maintenance and security team are working at Kah-Nee-Ta, and the tribes are keeping the property insurance, while the resort is now closed to the public.

This is the 'mothball option,' meaning the resort would still be in reasonable shape one day maybe to re-open. It is estimated that the closure costs will be up to \$720,000 annually.

The Kah-Nee-Ta board of directors, who had been serving with no compensation, has resigned, leaving the Tribal Council as the managing board.

In the letter of resignation, the board indicated they will continue to help in any way possible in the search for a viable model of operation for Kah-Nee-Ta.

Unlike the Forest Products Industries mill, the resort will not go into receivership because all of its debt is to the tribes themselves, rather than to any outside lender.

The Kah-Nee-Ta hamlets are still occupied through the end of the year, giving the tenants a chance to find new housing.

The tribes will continue to explore the possibility of working with an outside partner-investor to re-open Kah-Nee-Ta, said Jim Manion, former board member.

In late July, the board and management, as a last proposal before the ‘mothball’ option, presented Council with some final ideas.

These included allowing heli-skiing on Mt. Jefferson for resort guests. Other suggestions were multi-day lodge-based fishing trips along the Deschutes River, trophy game hunting, and the devel-

opment of a culture and wellness center.

There were drawbacks, though, including the need for a new loan to Kah-Nee-Ta in order to stay open.

Council eventually voted 3-0-5 to implement the mothball option.

In 2010, she was selected by the Tribal Council to serve as the Confederated Tribes’ Chief Operations Officer, a position she held until 2013.

During her time as COO, she was most proud of her work in planning and securing funding for the new Warm Springs elementary school, now known as the Warm Springs K-8 Academy.

Her strong commitment to children and their education was demonstrated by her long service as Secretary of the Oregon Indian Education Association.

Toto loved spending time with her family, especially her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She also loved to travel throughout the U.S. and abroad, spending time in recent years in New Zealand, Australia, Canada and many countries in Europe. She was also an avid fan of the Oregon Ducks in all sports.

Toto was very proud of her home. She was always working to improve it, and regularly hosted dinners, cook-outs and social events in her home for family and friends.

Toto was loved by all of her family and by everyone in the Warm Springs community and around Oregon and elsewhere who had the great fortune to know her.

She touched many, many lives with her kindness, generosity, her wonderful sense of humor and her unflagging willingness to help anyone in need.

Senators urge fish funding for Klamaths

Oregon’s U.S. Senators Jeff Merkley and Ron Wyden are urging U.S. Department of Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke to reverse his decision to withhold from the Klamath Tribe almost \$500,000 in already allocated funding for critical water quality research in the Upper Klamath Lake.

“The loss of this previously approved and dedicated funding source for understanding the impact of water quality on the health and wellbeing of the C’waam (Lost River sucker) and Koptu (shortnose sucker) will undermine ongoing efforts to prevent their extinction,” the senators wrote about the funding, which has supported research for the past four years.

Noting the tribal significance of—and water quality threats facing—the C’waam and Koptu fish in the Upper Klamath Lake, the senators continued, “Any progress on water challenges in the Klamath Basin, either in the short or long term, will be contingent on the willingness of stakeholders to trust one another. The decision to reprogram these funds at the eleventh hour has the appearance of an overtly political decision that will undermine efforts to reach a long-term solution in the Klamath Basin.”

The senators requested Zinke adhere to direction from Congress in the Fiscal Year 2018 spending bill and restore the \$472,550 in funding immediately.

Cobalt Crew

The Cobalt Crew spent the summer working on natural resource projects with the Heart of Oregon Corps.

Based in Warm Springs, the crew, with team leader Butch David, worked on the Crooked River National Grassland and Ochoco National Forest, improving habitat for wildlife.

Many young people from Warm Springs have joined the Heart of Oregon Corps. The non-profit is a regional group engaging local opportunity youth ages 16-24.

Some things to know about tribal Utilities

The Warm Springs Branch of Public Utilities primary responsibility is to administer and manage the construction, operation and maintenance of the tribes’ infrastructure for water, waste water and distribution collection systems, facilities and sanitation services for the community.

The following services are provided for the community:

Water treatment facilities. Water distribution maintenance and repairs. Wastewater treatment facilities. Solid waste collection and disposal. Underground utility installation and maintenance oversight.

Public Utilities maintains over 90 tribal buildings, including the Health and Wellness Center.

The Branch of Public Utilities consists of the following departments:

Administration. Janitorial/Custodial. Building maintenance. Maintenance engineering. Building/Safety inspections.

Water/Wastewater distribution. Environmental health. Sanitation and landfill. Grounds keeping.

Mission

The mission of the Branch of Public Utilities is to provide our community with the highest standard of public service that continually enhances the quality of life within our reservation boundaries.

Commonly asked questions

If I see water leaking, what

should I do?

If you see water leaking, please call Public Utilities with the location of the suspected water leak.

What is the process for submitting a work order?

A work order must be filled out by an authorized signer (for example, the person responsible for the bill).

It is then authorized, prioritized and sent to the appropriate Public Utilities department.

Utilities will assess the job needs, start date, timeline and estimated completion date. Arrangements are then made with Public Utilities

and homeowner on start date, timeline and estimated completion date.

If work is delayed, Public Utilities will communicate with the customer about the delay. Upon project completion, billing is prepared.

I have submitted a work order but am unsure of the status, who do I contact?

Please call Public Utilities to get an update on the status of a submitted work order, 541-553-3246.

How do I pay an outstanding bill with Public Utilities?

There are three options for

making a payment: Cash or check payments can be made at the Public Utilities front office.

Debit card payments can also be made at Cash Management in the Tribal Administration Building.

A payroll deduction or per capita deduction can also be arranged for services in advance for those who qualify.

Where can I get a copy of Annual Water Quality Reports?

Help for families with home water projects

An IHS program offers assistance to Indian families with the construction of sanitation facilities.

Assistance is available for water supply and sewage disposal facilities.

The IHS funds are used for items such as water wells, septic tanks, drainfields, lagoons, and community water and sewer hookups.

Requirements

You must be a member of a recognized Indian tribe. Then, fill out and sign an application for sanitation facilities.

You must own the property on which your home is located,

and provide with your application a copy of your proof of ownership of allotment, or a copy of your lease agreement (10-year minimum required). Some other requirements:

The home must be your permanent residence and capable of being occupied 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year.

The structure and foundation must be sound, the home must be insulated, and must have a permanently installed heating system.

The home must be served by a commercial electric utility and have interior plumbing facilities. Travel trailers, motor homes, and camp homes do not qualify for service.

Mobile homes must be permanently placed on the site, blocked leveled, tied down, skirted, and the towing tongue and wheels removed.

Submit the completed application to Travis Wells, General Manager, Branch of Public Utilities.

The application will be reviewed and presented to the tribal chairperson for signature. The application will then be forwarded to the IHS.

You will be notified by a representative of the IHS once your application has been received, and an evaluation of your site will be scheduled.

2018 CTWS Hunting Seasons

Tribal Council has approved the off-reservation and reservation hunting regulations, as proposed by the Branch of Natural Resources.

Please come by the Natural Resources office to pick up your tags, regulations and to sign up for lottery hunts.

Please take advantage of off reservation hunting tags: These opportunities take hunting pressure off the reservation, which may help improve wildlife populations.

Please make sure off reservation hunting takes place on public (unclaimed) lands. It is the hunter's responsibility to know where they are hunting, where they are allowed to hunt, what weapons they are allowed to use and what the bag limit is.

For questions regarding hunting please contact the Natural Resources Department at 541-553-2001.

The following are the 2018 off reservation hunts (the hunt, open season and bag limit):

Buck Deer - Rifle: Present through October 31: Open to buck deer having not less than a forked antler.

Metolius Unit Hunts special regulation dates:

Metolius Rifle: September 29 through October 19. Open to buck deer having not less than a forked antler.

Metolius Muzz.: October 20 through October 26. Open to any deer (50 tags available).

Metolius Archery: November 1 to November 30. Open to any deer (50 tags available).

Elk off reservation

Elk Archery: Present through September 28. Open to any Elk with archery only.

Elk Rifle: September 29 to October 12. Spike bulls and Antlerless Elk Rifle.

Bull Elk Rifle: October 15 to November 30. Open to bull elk with visible antler.

Elk Rifle: December 1 to Janu-

ary 31. Spike bulls and Antlerless Elk Rifle.

Special Animal Hunts

Pronghorn: Present through September 30. Either sex pronghorn antelope.

Bighorn sheep: Present to November 30. One ram per tag. Tags will be awarded to four Tribal members through a public drawing. Sign up for the lottery draw is at the Natural Resources front desk. Hunt locations are West John Day River (1 tag), Deschutes River (2 tags) and Aldrich (1 tag).

Black bear: Present to December 31. Either sex; excluding cubs less than one year and sows with cubs.

Cougar: Entire year. Either sex; excluding spotted kittens or female cougars with spotted kittens.

The following are the 2018 on reservation hunts:

Buck Deer - Rifle: September 29 to October 28. Open to buck deer having not less than a forked antler.
