Veterans Day at Indian Head

Indian Head Casino will host a special Veterans Day Slot Tournament from 5 to 7 p.m. on Friday, November 11. Some of the features include a guaranteed prize payout of \$500 cash; and all buyin revenue exceeding the guaranteed prize payout will be distributed to winners according to the payout structure: First, \$250 cash or 50 percent. Second, \$150 cash or 30 percent. And third, \$100 cash or 20 percent. These three also include a \$25 gas card.

Ten-dollar unlimited buy-ins with sign-ups starting at 4 p.m. Veterans and King Tier receive one free \$10 entry. Some of the promotional rules: Must be a Players' Club member; membership is 100-percent free. Must be 21 or older to participate.

Casino team welcomes new general manager

Shawn McDaniels started as general manager at Indian Head Casino about a month ago. He comes to the tribes from the Roseburg area, where he had worked as general manager at the Seven Feathers Casino Resort of the Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Indians. Mr. McDaniels was with Seven Feathers for nine years.

In fact, his tribal and other gaming management and development experience is extensive, going back more than 30 years.

Some years ago, just starting out, he was studying in the field of marine biology when he took a position at Harrah's Casino in Lake Tahoe. It turned out to be

a good fit: He was made a Harrah's 'presidential candidate,' meaning over time he would work at all of the jobs at the casino, getting to know the many aspects of each position.

When tribal gaming took off in Oregon, Mr. McDaniels moved north, helping design and open Spirit Mountain Casino, and then the Three Rivers Casino at Florence. Besides Oregon tribes, Mr. McDaniels helped develop two casinos on the Navajo Indian Reservation.

The Indian Head Casino board of directors earlier this year was looking for a new casino general manager. The board reviewed close to 100 qualified candidates, finding McDaniels' skills, insights and strategies to be outstanding.

Indian Head Casino, like others everywhere, was badly impacted by the pandemic. The work now is challenging, getting back to the vibrant and profitable enterprise of before.

Yet the progress is already noticeable. The Cottonwood Restaurant, for instance, is just starting to reopen, featuring the buffet table.

At full operation, Indian Head and the Plateau Travel Plaza together would have about 250 employees. At present the number is at about 150. The two years of pandemic shutdowns and restrictions took a toll on the workforce, and an effort now is to gain this back.

Mr. McDaniles, who moved here a month ago with his wife Cindy of 30 years, will be overseeing the renewal and rejuvenation of the tribes' gaming enterprise.

Here's to the cooks

Two of the outstanding cooks at the St. Charles-Madras Hospital Juniper Ridge Café are Maraya Culpus and Juanita Kalama White Elk. As it turns out, their mothers—Gina Walker and Greta White Elk—are long-time friends. Juanita and Maraya learned this after getting to know each other as Madras hospital cooks.

Maraya joined the café staff—she and Juanita also serve as dietician aids and cashiers—five or six years ago. At that time, Maraya worked as a server at Kah-Nee-Ta Resort. As it was becoming clear the resort was going to close, she found the cook position with the hospital kitchen.

Juanita joined the hospital staff about 14 months ago. Before, she was a cook at the

Warm Springs Academy. She had been with the Academy for several years working, for instance, during the covid school closures, when the cooks would prepare the student meals and help deliver them. Juanita has five grandkids, some attending the Academy.

Maraya is from Warm Springs, where she grew up with brother

Davey, and parents Vincent Culpus and Gina Walker.

Juanita, who is Oglala Sioux, is originally from the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota. She grew up in Warm Springs, and now lives in Madras. Her parents are Ross Kalama Sr. and Greta White Elk.

This month Juanita and Maraya will be making the Indian tacos and

other good items for the Native American Market at the Madras-St. Charles Hospital. The market will be from 11 to 3 p.m. on Tuesday, November 15. Tribal members will have a discount during the market, in recognition of Native American Heritage Month.

St. Charles' approach to health care overall includes cultural inclusion. At the Madras hospital, for instance, you see this on display with the wall art and at the Healing Garden, featuring works by Lillian Pitt, and the water feature with a sculpture of three salmon.

The goal for the hospital staff and providers is to mirror the demographics of the service area, and for St. Charles-Madras that would be about a third Native American, a third Latino and a third White.

Maraya and Juanita will help celebrate the diversity at the upcoming Native American Market, November 15.

Health, funding tour with IHS leadership

The Indian Health Service is a major funding source for health-related infrastructure improvements on the Warm Springs Reservation. This summer, as a recent example, IHS committed \$25 million in infrastructure money for the tribes, as part of the bi-partisan Infrastructure Law of 2021.

Much of this money is for necessary water system improvements, and for the Dry Creek landfill, both clearly community health projects. Last week, a team of top national and regional IHS officials visited the reservation, meeting with Tribal Council, and touring the water treatment plant.

IHS director Roselyn Tso was on hand for the Council meeting and tour. "This was a very productive day," director Tso said.

The Council meeting and tour with tribal Utilities, she said, clarified the pressing need

Election Day on Tuesday, November 8

The General Election is next Tuesday, November 8.

The unofficial results will be known at 8 p.m. on Election Day. The official results are posted by the last day of the month, to include ballots post-marked on or before November 8.

On the ballot are the offices of U.S. Senator, Oregon Governor, state representative, and state judgeship positions.

For the county are the offices of clerk, county commissioner, treasurer and sheriff. All include unopposed candidates except the commissioner position. For commissioner are candi-

dates Mark Wunsch and Mae Huston.

On the local ballots in Jefferson County is measure 16-104, a renewal of the five-year local option tax for general operations of the Madras Aquatic Center Recreation District. The levy would not increase property taxes, but rather renews the current rate approved by voters in 2017 and will provide district continued funds to sustain district's current recreation operations and services. Tribal land of the reservation is not subject to the property tax.

On the local ballots for Jefferson County, County

Measure 16-101 is looking to prohibit psilocybin-related businesses within Jefferson County. The question to Jefferson County voters is: 'Shall Jefferson County prohibit psilocybinrelated business, including product manufacturers and service centers in Jefferson County?'

There is a statewide ballot measure asking whether to remove language allowing "slavery and involuntary servitude" as punishment for a crime. Another state measure: "Requires a permit to acquire firearms; and police to maintain a permit/ firearm database; and

criminally prohibits certain ammunition magazines."

Another state measure asks whether to amend the state constitution: "Legislators with ten unexcused absences from floor sessions are disqualified from holding the next term of office."

You can return ballots by mail with postage paid and it needs to be received by 8 p.m. on November 8 to count. You can also return ballots at any official drop box. Local drop boxes are located at Three Warriors Market in Simnasho, on campus near Fire and Safety in Warm Springs and at the County Clerk's office in Madras.

Preparing for change to ICWA

The Indian Child Welfare Act has been the law for 44 years.

Passed by Congress in 1978, ICWA provides statutory protection to tribal families: Essentially, the law provides a framework for keeping tribal children connected to their Native cultures, and seeks to preserve the future of tribal nations.

The possibility that aspects of the law may change, or be overturned, raises concerns and the need to be prepared.

Last week, the Confederated Tribes Health and Human Services held a discussion session regarding the future of ICWA. Present were people who work in children and youth services from the tribes and the region.

A sign of the significance of the ICWA development: A second discussion, hosted by the Oregon Department of Human Services, is scheduled for this Wednesday, November 2 at Willamette University, also available for virtual attendance.

The state Human Services department is inviting tribal community members and students from schools across the state to come and join the discussion.

These kinds of meetings are also happening across the U.S., as the future of ICWA is the subject of a U.S. Supreme Court hearing coming up this month, raising the possibility the act may be modified, or overturned in part or in whole.

In 1978, when Congress passed the law, the issue to be addressed was that generations of tribal chil-

dren across the U.S. had been removed from their families and communities, often placed permanently without connection to the Native culture and families.

Two years ago, the Oregon Legislature passed the Oregon Indian Child Welfare Act.

This created a state-based Indian Child Welfare Act that aligned with the federal law, while also honoring the unique needs and experiences of tribal nations in Oregon.

The Oregon Indian Child Welfare Act was strengthened during the 2021 Legislative Session. However, if provisions of the federal law are overturned, this would affect the state law as well.

The constitutionality of the federal act is challenged by the case of *Haaland v. Brackeen*. Oral arguments in this case are scheduled

before the U.S. Supreme Court on November 9.

The situation is complex, and this complexity is the reason for the discussions happening with tribes and the states. The November 2 panel discussion with the Oregon Department of Human Services is titled 'Complex Conversations: Tribal Rights Are Human Rights – Protecting Oregon's Indian Child Welfare Act.'

As an example of concern that is raised by the U.S. Supreme current consideration of the law: "If the Supreme Court rules ICWA unconstitutional, it could have devastating consequences for Native children, families and tribes while simultaneously putting the existence of tribes in jeopardy," according to the American Civil Liberties Union

Oregon tribes' travel guide

The Travel Guide to Oregon Indian Country, recently released by Travel Oregon, is a collaboration with Oregon's nine federally recognized tribes highlighting tourism assets and cultural resources around tribal lands.

The guide features profiles on each of the nine tribes: the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, the Grand Ronde, Burns Paiute Tribe, Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua and Siuslaw Indians, Coquille Indian Tribe, Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians, the Klamath Tribes, Con-

federated Tribes of Siletz Indians, and the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation.

The guide aims to inspire visitors to travel to tribal regions, and includes information on tribal museums, casinos, outdoor activities and

Travel Oregon published a similar guide in 2005, but it felt there were key voices missing from the conversation. In 2019, Travel Oregon reached out to the tribes in hopes of building a relationship. Those conversations sparked the idea to pull together a work group to create a new travel guide.

This time there was more dialogue about how each tribe wanted the guide to come together, and there was a deeper investment in building community around tourism goals.

The individuality of each tribe was an important aspect to convey. The guide needed to represent the diversity of the entire state.

Travel Oregon originally printed 100,000 copies of the guide and has already distributed about 35,000 cop-

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

In 1990, United States President George H.W. Bush signed Joint Resolution 577 designating November as the first National American Indian Heritage Month. The joint resolution read:

"American Indians were the original inhabitants of the lands that now constitute the United States of America." It was the first such official statement, which has been signed every year by a sitting president.

At the Museum at Warm Springs, we celebrate our unique cultures, traditions, histories, arts and languages every month. Indeed, our staff is dedicated to upholding the museum's mission of "preserving, advancing and sharing the traditions, cultural and artistic heritage of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, and other Indigenous peoples" every day of the year.

We do this joyfully, with purpose, and with the knowledge and, even more importantly, the satisfaction that we are gifting our visitors with information and an experience they may not receive anywhere else.

The people of the Warm

Springs Reservation have always looked to the landscape around us for our knowledge. Languages and land have been intertwined for thousands of years.

With each vision quest, an individual brought back to the community a new understanding learned from the environment. Our land bestowed knowledge and practical intimacy through its processes and qualities. This cultural practice—a personal journey deep into myth for reclamation of ancient elements and acclamations of respect for all life to come potently binds us to enduring values.

I want all of you who visit the Museum at Warm Springs to note the word inscribed above the museum's entrance. It is 'Twanat,' which means 'to follow.'

We follow these practices, teachings and actively follow our ancestors to prepare for tomorrow. "This land is for you to know and live upon and pass on to the children." It is 'Ticham,' a concept in the Warm Springs culture that connects an individual to the ancient activity on the land and is of the land.

The beautiful and continuing cultures of the Columbia River Plateau speak of time immemorial — the beginning of this world, the demise of previous epochs, and what is to come—a visceral prophecy.

As much as language, the patterns of the Warm Springs people have documented, preserved and carried on our culture. Our leaders and culture bearers bring the new into the potency of image.

This is 'Tananawit,' ('Peoples' Way of Life'), referring to a culture that our people had in the past, is practiced today, and something that can be taught for the future.

In the past the artists, storytellers and teachers of our traditional ways carried our collective knowledge, rights and sovereign nationhood from generation to present, to the future.

Please plan a visit to the museum in November. We will be opening a new exhibit on Tuesday, November 15—The Warm Springs Twenty-Ninth Annual Tribal Member Adult and Youth Exhibit.

This popular annual exhibit will combine Tribal member adult and youth art into one spectacular display. The exhibit will include many generations of beautiful artistry in paintings, drawings, mixed-media, beadwork, weavings, video, photography and more, in two categories of Traditional and Contemporary Art. Plan your visit to coincide with your holiday plans and spend some time in the museum's popular Gift Shop, where you will find something for everyone on your list. We look forward to seeing you here and celebrating our arts and cultures with you during National Native American Heritage Month!







Go around the class, having students practice saying what they will borrow. Their partners can say "yes" and give them a flashcard of that item, or say "no" and keep the item to themselves.


