# Skatepark grand opening in spring

The new skatepark grand opening at Elmer Quinn Park is planned for this spring, depending on weather.

The fundraising and organizing began in 2021, and actual work began last October, and has included the construction of the concrete skatepark ramps.

Other amenities, like a frisbee golf course, will add to the new attractions at the park.

# Results of point-in-time survey

The Health and Human Services Branch and partners recently conducted the 2023 Point-In-Time survey, giving an estimate of the incidence of homelessness among the tribal community, and insights about their situations.

The Confederated Tribes' count was part of the nationwide point-in-time surveys. For the tribal event, 97 people attended, and 81 completed surveys, giving the rough estimate.

In addition to completing surveys, the participants were able to learn about medical help such as flu and covid shots, and acupuncture services. The participants also visited with the IHS business office and contact representatives, offering advice regarding the Oregon Health Plan enrollment, for instance.

The Indian Head Casino general manager Shawn McDaniel and staff assisted with surveys and meals. The Commodities staff, and Ron Hager of Prevention and Joni Wallulatum from Health Modernization and Prevention also helped out; as well as the Health and Human Services Administration and Library staff.

# New Automotive class now on track

The War Pony Express Training Center holds the key to many possibilities. The Automotive Center is a classroom ready to teach and then award the participating students ASE Certification—the essential certificate of Automotive Service Excellence. This key element alone opens employment doors for young people, both on the reservation and off.

And looking beyond, the Automotive Center presents an opportunity for business growth and economic development on the reservation; plus a way for the tribes to save money on maintenance and repair of the organization vehicle fleet.

War Pony Express, located at the industrial park Vehicle Pool, opened last week. Wayne Miller is the program director. He brings his automotive experience—with Dodge, Auto Zone and Smolich Motors, for instance—to the Training Center. "This is a wonderful opportunity," Mr. Miller says, "A plus for everyone."

Miller graduated from the Central Oregon Community College Automotive program is 2017, leading to an Automotive repair career, before bringing

the instructor back to Warm Springs. "I jumped at the chance to come back and teach here," Wayne says. Gordon Scott, who used to work at the Vehicle Pool before it closed some years ago, is helping as the Small Engine and Mechanic instructor, part-time for now.

Bringing the Automotive Center to reality has required teamwork by several people and a number of entities. First, the Tribal Education Branch began planning for the

project a couple of years ago. Education general manager Valerie Switzler was the lead in building the partnership team. Among the tribal organization, Ms. Switzler worked with Melinda Poitra of the Workforce Education and Development Department—WEDD—and the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, or WIOA; and recruiting William Slockish.

Their work led to a partnership with the Jefferson County School District 509-J, including the Roots



and Bridges programs. And Central Oregon Community College is another essential partner, through the college's Automotive Technology program. COCC Automotive Technology will now be able to bring its classes to the War Pony Express center. Class credit for the students could be at both 509-J and COCC. Carl Cavallo of COCC Automotive Technology is serving as advisor to the program.

For now there are 13 students in this initial semester of the training center. A great thing about going into the automotive field is the variety of specialties that students can focus on, Wayne Miller says: Electronics, transmission, suspension and brakes are just a few examples.

There are several buses located by the Training Center. These can be used for training, as the vehicles can be put on the lift and worked on by the students with intsructor supervision.

Any candidate who would like to file must fill out and submit an SEL 190 form.



As mentioned earlier, the training center is, first of all, a great opportunity for students, and future employment and business opportunities. However, other benefits are readily associated with the new venture. For instance, the tribes have not had a vehicle repair center for several years, requiring the work to be contracted

out.

A more ideal situation for the tribal organization, financially, would be to have the service available within the organization, such as at the vehicle pool training center. Another point that Mr. Miller points out: As the Automotive Center is established, the venture could be used as a model for training centers that could teach in the

fields of plumbing, electricity, HVAC maintenance and installation, as examples. All of these services would be great additions to the tribal organization and the membership.

The classes at the War Pony Express training center are Tuesdays through Thursdays, bringing a great student education opportunity to the reservation.

# Revision to salmon rules sparks outcry

As last year's Christmas holiday approached, a last-minute change was made to Oregon fish regulations that critics say nullifies years of work to protect threatened and endangered salmon and steelhead species.

The change concerns the definition of "fish passages," engineering structures, including fish ladders that allow migrating salmon to voluntarily swim past dams and other obstructions. Under the new rule change, fish

passages now include trap-andhaul procedures, according to critics of the rule change.

Trap-and-haul procedures involve people catching salmonids and moving them, often by tanker truck, to waters above or below impediments. This includes moving juvenile fish from their natal waters and moving adults to their spawning grounds.

The rule change, say its critics, essentially turns the definition of "fish passage" on its

head, to the detriment of salmonids, and could make it harder to modify or even remove dams to aid migrating fish.

Oregon tribes are also concerned about the changed definition.

A January letter to the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission from tribal leaders details concerns, calling the rule change an "unlawful" and "last hour" revision.

The letter goes on to state, "tribes reserve the right to seek all appropriate legal remedies."

### OMSI district plan with Native component

The Portland Design Commission has signed off on plans for a new high-rise district on the Southeast Portland holdings of the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry and surrounding blocks.

Plans call for a waterfront education park, planned in cooperation with the Affiliated Tribes of Northwest Indians and the Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission; and a Center for Tribal Nations.

Plans also call for about 3 million square feet of new construction on the 10-block, 34-acre plan area, much of it on vacant land that OMSI now uses for parking or that has recently been used for construction staging.

The new development could in-

clude hotels, restaurants, storefronts, offices and as many as 1,200 new apartments.

The museum said at least 20 percent of the new housing would have rents affordable to low-income families, similar to the number required under the city's inclusionary zoning policy for new housing construction.

The tournament is scheduled to take place July 17-23 in Phoenix, and will feature inspiring educational components presented by the Phoenix Indian Center, including the Invitational College and Career Fair, and Educational Youth Summit.

The championship games will be played at the Footprint Center, home of the Phoenix Suns and Mercury. Two graduating seniors will stand on the center court during halftime to receive \$10,000 in college scholarships.


While we breathe all the time, breathing to help anxiety and stress is different. The goal is to slow down the stress process and bring us back to the present moment.

#### The U.S. is finally inviting tribes to help manage land

Last April, in a farm field in eastern Virginia, Ann Richardson gathered with a few hundred people for a celebration. It wasn't a party, though. Several people were crying. Interior Secretary Deb Haaland was there. She was crying, too.

Richardson is the chief of the Rappahannock Tribe, and on that afternoon, her tribe took back more than 460 acres of ancestral land along the river that shares her tribe's name. Last month, her tribe reclaimed another 960 acres of its homeland, too.


It took 350 years. It took survival, after her tribe was forced off of its homeland by English settlers in the 1600s, virtually erased by white supremacists in the 1900s and endured centuries of persecution sanctioned by

the U.S. government.

It also took a new kind of partnership with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, as the administration forges ahead with what it hopes will spur a seismic shift in the way the government approaches managing public lands: inviting tribes to be co-stewards of the land their ancestors were forcibly or illegally removed from by the government.

Since this administration took office, Haaland and Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack have signed off on nearly two dozen costewardship agreements with tribes.

There are another 60 co-stewardship agreements in various stages of review involving 45 tribes. Haaland and Vilsack launched this effort in November 2021.

## Important change to health care coverage

The following is an important update from the Warm Springs Health and Wellness Center:

The Oregon Health Plan on April 1 will be complying with the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023. This law includes various Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program provisions, including significant changes to the continuous enrollment condition.

The continuous enrollment condition will end on March 31 of this year, and states must return to normal eligibility and enrollment operations.

Some states will be able to terminate Medicaid enrollment for individuals no longer eligible beginning April 1.

The state of Oregon announced they are committed to Maintaining Coverage. The state will be reevaluating recipient's Medicaid eligibility and renewal information will be sent out to all currently on the Oregon Health Plan.

**Question:** To avoid interruptions in benefits, what actions should American Indians and Alaskan natives take?

Answer: American Indians and Alaska Natives with Medicaid or CHIP—Children's Health Insurance Plan—coverage should:

- **1.** Update their contact information with their State Medicaid or CHIP program; and
- **2.** Look out for a letter from their state about completing a renewal form.

**Question:** Who can help you with your application?

Answer: The Warm Springs Health and Wellness Center has a Contact Representative Team. This team consists of:

Victoria Katchia, Paula Miller, Veronica Baez from the IHS Business Office; and Rhonda Green from the CTWS Purchased and Referred Care program.

Team members are certified Community Partners with the Oregon Health Authority and:

· Are authorized to assist you in completing your application.

• Will confirm your information and have you sign an authorization to allow them to process an application on your behalf.

# Tribal smelt fishing open on Cowlitz, Sandy

The tribes' Branch of Natural Resources smelt surveyor on the Cowlitz River has found that smelt are available as of mid February, and tribal Fisheries is hoping the run will continue to build. Updates will be coming soon from Fisheries.

Fishers should make plans to head up to the river any time now. Smelt can be eaten fresh or frozen, smoked or dried to preserve for the coming months.

Please work with our surveyor to record your catch, or call Mark Manion at 541-460-0272 to report within 24 hours.

Recently, Tribal Council approved the smelt regulations for the Cowlitz and Sandy rivers.

Smelt may be harvested seven days per week from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Gear is limited to dip nets, and the tribal allocation is 2,500 pounds of smelt for each

Please let them check your catch and don't forget to have your enrollment cards on your person while fishing.

If you do not run into one of our surveyors please report your catch to the harvest manager at 541-460-0272 within 24 hours. Remember this is a subsistence fishery and the fish may not be sold.

# First spring chinook crosses Willamette Falls

The spring chinook of the year crossed Willamette Falls on Valentine's Day. The adult hatchery fish joined one other 'first' salmon recently across Bonneville Dam.

Oregon and Washington biologists are meeting in Ridgefield this week to decide non-tribal sport fishing seasons.

Decisions will be based on forecasts of nearly 200,000 upriver Columbia springers and more than 70,000 to the Willamette and Clackamas rivers.

A season is already open on the Willamette River and Multnomah Channel.

# Some opposition to pipeline proposal

Advocates and elected officials spoke at a meeting Monday night on the expansion of a natural gas pipeline that cuts through Central Oregon. One of the opponents who spoke was U.S. Senator Jeff Merkley.


The pipeline, called the Gas Transmission Northwest, is 61 years old and runs from California to British Columbia.

The non-profit group 350 Deschutes engages in climate advocacy and climate education. The group has concerns over plans to expand the GTN XPress gas pipeline.

"This would totally derail Oregon's efforts to regulate emissions and to address climate change," said 350Deschutes executive director Diane Hokiak. "As far as we can tell, we think that it comes within two miles of the downtown area and Bend, and we have identified that it actually runs through two proposed subdivisions on the east side."

"Ultimately, the decision is up to FERC, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission," said Satya Austin-Opper with 350Deschutes.

"So, we want to make our

voices heard because they haven't really included a lot of public comment in this process so far, we don't know when they're going to make a decision on it, but it could be as early as next month."

Senator Merkley said, "This is an unnecessary and an unwanted project. It does the opposite of what we're trying to achieve in Oregon and the Pacific Northwest for our climate objectives to contribute to the solutions, not to make the problem worse."

Merkley expressed concerns over global climate change partnerships over this potential expansion and the potential environmental impact it may have. "This flew under the radar a bit because instead of a new pipeline, it's doubling," Sen. Merkley said.

"The pressure in the existing pipeline doesn't matter, equivalent to doubling the capacity of the pipeline, doubling the damage. And we have to double down in our fight against."

Gas Transmission Northwest or GTN says they offer families and businesses in our area a safe and reliable source of fuel for things like cooking and utilities. They've also set greenhouse gas emissions reduction targets, including to achieve zero emissions from operations by 2050.

# Sea lions still a threat to Columbia River salmon

Tribal and state agencies for decades now have made various attempts to control salmon depradation by Stellar and California sea lions in the upper Columbia River.

Yet fisheries biologists still consider sea lions, or pinnipeds, a threat to at-risk salmon populations in the Columbia.

A recent statistic: Between August 2021 and May 2022, more than 7,000 fish in the Bonneville Dam tailrace were killed by Columbia River sea lions. This number comes from the Portland U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' 2022 predation report.

And the number is significant, accounting for about 12.4 percent of the salmon run during the agency's observation period.

For several years, tribes and state agenies tried mostly non-lethal methods to control the predation.

These methods included construction of exclusion gates to keep sea lions out of the fishways; the use of hazing like pyrotechnics and rubber buckshot; and even physical removal and relocation of some of the animals.

Each of the methods resulted in only temporary mitigation. Ac-

tual euthanization was rare, as sea lions are protected under the Marine Mammal Protection Act.

In August 2020, under an amendment to the law, the National Marine Fisheries Service issued a permit to the six tribes, including the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, and three Northwest states to more readily and lethally remove sea lions in the Columbia River basin. The new standard created 'safe zones' for fish that are protected under the Endangered Species Act, and at the mouths of tributaries where the fish are going to spawn.

And this approach has helped, as the 2020 fish run showed improvement, especially at the area of Willamette Falls, where the fish were nearly extinct in 2017.

Yet the sea lions remain a problem, as the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers assessment indicates.

The Madras girls varsity won Monday night in Prineville, finishing out the regular season with a win over Crook County 45-35.






