

Miss Warm Springs Pageant next Friday

The 2024 Miss Warm Springs Pageant is coming up next Friday evening, February 16 at the Agency Longhouse. Candidates are still invited to participate in the community event. Stop by the Tribal Council office and speak with Sandra or Minnie; or use the contact information below.

The Miss Warm Springs tradition started in the 1950s, when the tribes were commemorating the One-Hundred Year Anniversary of the Treaty of 1855. In 1955 the very first Miss Warm Springs was now atwai Kathleen Heath.

The pageant became a regular and annual tradition in 1969, at the time of the first Pi-Ume-Sha celebration. At that time, now atwai Dorothy 'Pebbles' George was chosen Miss Warm Springs.

And since then, the pageant has happened annually with few exceptions, such as covid. To date, forty women have served as Miss Warm Springs. Miss Warm Springs is honored as a cultural ambassador of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs , nd as a role model for the community.

She may speak at public functions in the community, regionally and nationally. Representing the tribes, Miss Warm Springs attends local events like powwows, rodeos, parades and fairs, and more formal gatherings such as national conferences.

During the pageant, candidates show their understanding of the tribes, the history, traditional foods and food ceremonies; and her own respective tribal ceremonies.

To be eligible, candidates must be an enrolled tribal member, 18-

Inspiring story behind new children's book

If you are in the mood to read a great little story that brightens your day, then pick up a copy of the new publication *Celeste Goes to Warm Springs,* created by Theodore E. Perez. This is a children's book though in a way the story and pictures are for any person who would like some fun entertainment and to feel good.


The story is pretty simple, following Papa Theo, his daughter Celeste and her cousins as they visit various places of interest around the reservation. The extreme charm of the book is in the telling of their adventures, and in the bright and beautiful illustrations, together making this a wonderful reading experience.

"It's been selling much quicker than I ever thought possible," author and illustrator Theo Perez was saying.

"And I'm very humbled by the response. At first I was thinking maybe a few of my relatives would be interested in a copy to read to their kids."

Instead, Amazon.com and the Barnes & Noble Bookstore offer the publication for sale.

Mr. Perez is the director of Warm Springs Commodities. His grandmother is atwai Celestine 'Celeste' Brunoe. Theo shares how his new book came about:

While he was growing up Theo and his grandmother would read bedtime stories together. Later in life, when she had passed away, Celeste became the inspiration for Theo to create a new story for children.

In her memory, he says, "I thought we should make our own bedtime story. We should have one set here in Warm Springs, and we should have a positive image of Warm Springs for young people."

Bringing his idea to actual publication has taken a few years. He stayed at it, though, through many trials and errors. After all, he had made a commitment to his grandmother. "When I make a promise," Theo says, "even if the person passes, I have to follow through."

He attributes this quality, and his creative side in general to a condition, attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder, and high functioning autism. "It can be both a curse and a blessing," Theo says.

There were days when his work on the book would turn out easily and beautifully, and days when it was terrible and had to be completely redone. "So it maybe took me longer than most people," he says.



The result has been well worth the wait, as *Celeste Goes to Warm Springs* is a great addition to the literature of the tribes. In addition, all proceeds from sales of the book go to a non-profit of his kids' choosing.

Theo dedicates the book to Josephine Tafoya, Theo Orion Brunoe, Jocelyn Rose Greene, Cecilia Ann Brunoe, and atwai Celestine Brunoe. And on the Acknowledgements page of *Celeste Goes to Warm Springs*, Theo writes: "To the Warm Springs, Oregon community. May we continue to rise and overcome as we grow together in a positive light."

Wasco Chiftainship meeting

Currently, an Agency District meeting regarding the Wasco Chieftainship is scheduled for Monday, February 12. There will be a light meal at 6 p.m. at the Longhouse, and the meeting to follow at 7.

The Chieftainship is a lifetime position, and a voting member of the Tribal Council for the Confederated Tribes. The Wasco Chief represents the Agency District. The Wasco Chieftainship has been vacant since the passing of Alfred Smith Jr. in September of 2022. a great addition to the tribal enterprises, employing up to 70 people, and creating many good-paying jobs for tribal members.

The Travel Plaza itself, open 24 hours, features top diesel and gas fuel services with the best prices around; plus the convenience store with deli, and other amenities for travelers like showers and laundry. The Three Teepees Café—now with new hours and new menu—is open 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily. The well-reviewed café also offers food to go and callin orders, at 541-777-2815.

And of course, the 13,500square-foot Plaza building hosts the gaming room, with 40-plus slots open Monday and Tuesday 12 noon to 10 p.m.; and Wednesday through Sunday 10 a.m. to 2 a.m. "That is probably our number one attraction," said Shawn McDaniel, Indian Head Casino general manager.

"Then second would be the fuel prices," Mr. McDaniel said.

The 'gaming room,' as the popular attraction is currently known, is across from the Three Teepees Café, and is in need of a more fitting name.

"It is a big attraction," said Esten Culpus, director of the Plateau Travel Plaza. "And we have many regular customers." Some players stop by when they don't have time to drive down the hill to Indian Head, Mr. Culpus said.

The Plateau gaming room became especially well-known in the area starting back in 2020 during covid, when the Oregon Lottery was closed, for instance, Esten said.

With its consistent success, the tribes' gaming enterprise is looking to invest in upgrades to the gaming aspect of the travel center, McDaniel said. The current planning phase of the improvement project brought up the idea of a name for the gaming area, he said.

The gaming enterprise always hosts a community contest when it comes to finding the perfect name for one of its features, from Indian Head to the Cottonwood Restaurant, Tule Gill, Three Teepees Café and the Plateau Travel Plaza name itself. Anthony Anderson submitted that winning entry during the 2017 travel plaza naming contest.

The prize for the winning entry is \$250. All tribal members can participate by sending name suggestions to: guest.services@indian headgaming.com likely to be confused with another similar business or enterprise; and not be the trademark, trade name or property of another person or entity.

During the contest, in instances where the same name is submitted, the judging committee will select the one with the earliest entry by time and date.

The author of the winning suggestion, chosen by the selection committee, will receive a \$250 check. Members of the committee will not know the names associated with the contest. Additional rules:

Only two entries per submission. The winner is solely responsible for all federal, state and local taxes on the prize.

The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs Utilities Department will be seeking funding in 2024 from the U.S. Department of Agriculture - Rural Development in the amoung of \$848,000.

The purpose of the public meeting is to update and notify the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs water users of the progress of the Shitike Creek Bridge Crossing 16 inch water main. **Chico Holliday**, Public Utilities.

Class of 2023 had great graduation rate

The statewide graduation rate in Oregon for last year's graduating class was 81.3 percent, tying the previous class as second highest ever recorded in the state.

While the overall rate held steady, some student groups reached all-time highs for graduation, including former English learners and migrant students

The statewide overall graduation rate for the American Indian-Alaska Native group remained about steady at just above 68 percent. There remains room for improvement as the rate overall for students of all the groups was at 81 percent.

Other key findings from the recent Oregon Department of Education report include:

• Students completing two credits in an approved Career and Technical Education, or CTE, program of study significantly exceeded the statewide average, graduating at a rate of 95 percent.

• Former English learners—students who have successfully completed English Learner programs prior to entering high school in Oregon—graduated at 87.6 percent, six percentage points higher than the statewide average and an alltime high for that student group. • Special Education students also saw the highest graduation rate for that student group at 68.6 percent.

• The graduation rate for students experiencing houselessness increased 2 percentage points to 60.6 percent which is also a record high for that student group.

• For the first time, graduation rates are reported for military connected students, 86.7 percent; and students with experience in incarceration or detention, 35.8 percent.

Flu and covid vaccine clinics with IHS

The Warm Springs Community Health programs are hosting covid and flu vaccine clinics. One of the clinics is this Wednesday, February 7 from 1 to 4 p.m. at the clinic. This is a walk-in clinic in pod A.

Invited are tribal employees, and community members who are not eligible for primary care at IHS; or are not members of a federally recognized tribe. The second walkin clinic will be next Tuesday, February 13 at the clinic, 1270 Kot-Num Road, pod A.

Only the Moderna Covid-19 vaccine, and flu vaccines will be available at these times. Please check in at the Community Health window and let them know you are there for the employee covid vaccine clinic.

If these times do not work for you, please call Community Health at 541-553-2352, and ask to speak with Marc Mason, RN, to schedule a time to come in when he is available. Please avoid walk-in outside of these times, as the clinic staff would like to ensure there is staff available to assist you.



Museum exhibit looks at Wasco home life...

By treaty in 1855 the Tribes of Middle Oregon agreed with the United States government to create the Warm Springs Reservation. The reservation was intended to partly compensate the tribes relinquishing rights to the 10-million acres of Ceded Lands.

The Wascos were the eastern-

most Chinook-speakers. The Wascos received their name from the village of Wasq'u, their principal village at the Columbia.

The name means 'small bowl' or 'cup' and may be a reference to a cup-shaped rock near the village into which a spring bubbled. The Wascos traditionally lived on the south bank of the Columbia River between the current towns of the The Dalles and Hood River.

The Museum at Warm Springs includes an exhibit of Wasco homelife of the nineteenth century, shown here in photos. The museum re-opens again next Tuesday, February 13.

Sensing Sasquatch

What does Sasquatch represent to you? The unknown, adventure or mystery?

'Tillie' Charlene Dimmick of the Confederated Tribes, and four other indigenous artists if the region will explore these questions with a new exhibit Sensing Sasquatch, opening March 2 at the High Desert Museum. This major exhibit examines the curious aspects of the primate-like, reclusive and elusive being in the context of the High Desert region.

Native peoples of the Plateau have long known about, encountered, depicted and told stories about Sasquatch.

Sensing Sasquatch will explore Sasquatch's past, present and future in the High Desert region through an Indigenous



lens. Works by five Indigenous artists will be on view, including:

Charlene Dimmick of the Warm Springs tribes; Phillip Cash Cash, Ph.D. (Nez Perce, Cayuse), HollyAnna Cougar-Tracks DeCoteau Little-bull (Yakama, Nez Perce, Cayuse, Cree), Frank Buffalo Hyde (Nez Perce, Onondaga) and Rocky LaRock (Salish).

Rather than the popular, mainstream view of Sasquatch, this exhibition will show Sasquatch as a protective entity for many Indigenous peoples of the High Desert. The exhibit will reflect the reverence that Native peoples have for Sasquatch and will be centered on Indigenous art, voices and storytelling.

The original word for

Sasquatch is "Sasq'ets," which comes from the Halq'emeylem language of Coast Salish First Nation peoples from southwestern British Columbia.

Sasquatch is much taller than a human.

Its habitat is often associated with the wet rainforests of the coastal Pacific Northwest.

Sasquatch also lives beyond the green, lush climate. In the High Desert region, Sasquatch strides among the dry canyonlands, ponderosa pine forests and shrublands.

Popular depictions of Sasquatch can be found everywhere across America. Sasquatch is emblazoned on everything from t-shirts and road signs to beer cans and traveling mugs. Before entering the exhibition there

will be an homage to the pop culture icon that Sasquatch has become, but visitors will be asked to leave these ideas and perceptions behind to consider another side of Sasquatch's story.

Visitors will be introduced to the Indigenous Plateau of the High Desert and the arid forests and canyonlands where Native peoples have long come into contact with and exchanged stories about Sasquatch.

They will see representations, stories and artwork about Sasquatch and how they vary between tribes and across regions. A contemporary carved mask by Rocky LaRock will show visitors that knowledge of Sasquatch is both ancient and contemporary. A digital language map will show the various names for Sasquatch across the Indigenous Plateau and beyond.

- 5. Say the Paiute words for basic body parts, for full control.

PROCEDURES:

Introduction: 1.

Tell the students they will learn the Paiute language for some body parts by making a felt board cutout. Review the words for the body parts that you want to cover in this lesson.

Implementation: 2.

Make the Cut-Outs

Put a stick-figure on the felt board. Give felt, scissors, and other decoration supplies to the students. Assign each student to make a felt cut-out of a particular body part. Chat in Paiute and reinforce the words for body parts with the class. Let them repeat after you.

Calif. governor has new plan to save salmon

There's a newly restored wetland at the edge of Prairie Creek, a stream that crosses ancestral Yurok land in Northern California's Redwood National Park.

The site is humble at first glance: an expanse of mud along the streamside, where starts of native vegetation dot the ground, and quiet pools branch off from the main flow of the creek. But this carefully rebuilt backwater holds an array of rare young fish. On Monday, California Gov. Gavin Newsom stood by as researchers pulled juvenile chinook and coho salmon along with steelhead and cutthroat trout from the water and displayed them in a clear plastic box.

Newsom and his entourage paid a visit to this area to see salmon restoration in action, and to announce a sweeping new plan intended to protect California's iconic fish.

The state's once-abundant salmon have been devastated by sediment pollution from logging, overfishing and massive habitat loss due to decades of dam construction. As summer temperatures soar and snow-

More condors from Oregon released in Calif.

Seven California condors were released into the wild in that state after the endangered animals were hatched and raised at Oregon Zoo.

The birds spent time at the zoo's Jonsson Center for Wildlife Conservation located in rural Clackamas County on Metro-owned open land, and recently flew out of a cage in San Simeon, Calif.

The wild releases were

'soft releases,' meaning the birds exit their pens at their own time. The condor, or thunderbird, is a sacred bird of Northwest tribes, and featured on beaded and other imagery, for instance.

pack dwindles due to humancaused climate change, there's increasingly less of the cold water the remaining salmon need to survive.

Newsom's new plan puts the governor's guarantee on actions that only a few years ago appeared radical, such as taking down multiple old dams, or building infrastructure that would allow salmon to skirt them and reach the streams where they lay eggs.

The plan also emphasizes creative means of restoring salmon habitat. Many of the projects build on long-term efforts by tribes and conservation groups, and some, like a program in which Central Valley rice farmers allow their flooded fields to be used as rearing habitat for fish, offer hope that agriculture and restoration can be combined.

"I'm operating with a completely different mindset, in terms of how we approach these old issues."

"The reality is, we just have to disabuse ourselves that we can operate with the old rules," Newsom told High Country News. "Across the board, Mother Nature's not cooperating with that. It's just a different world, so I'm operating with a completely different mindset, in terms of how we approach these old issues. I try to pave a little bit of a different path."

Newsom was joined by top state wildlife officials, as well as representatives from the Yurok Tribe. Frankie Myers, the tribe's vice-chair, described the Prairie Creek project as a small but inspirational part of his people's effort to reclaim a landscape that sustains salmon.

Decades ago, when a lumber mill was built at the stream's edge, the banks were lined with stone riprap, forming a narrow channel where water blasted through at high speeds. This was no place for a salmon or trout to spend time. By removing the riprap and reshaping shallow banks where the stream can form quiet pools, Yurok workers have created vital rearing habitat for salmonids: a place where young fish can rest, feed and grow until they're ready to swim out to the Pacific.
