Atwai Kathleen Heath was chosen for the role, and is the first Miss Warm Springs. The tribes then held the first Miss Warm Springs Pageant in 1969, about the time of the first Pi-Ume-Sha. In the 1969 Pageant, atwai Dorothy 'Pebbles' George was selected as Miss Warm Springs. Since that time, the Pageant has happened annually with few exceptions.

Basketball tournament celebrating 59th year

The Fifty-Ninth Annual Warm Springs All Indian Men's Holiday Tournament starts this Thursday, January 23, and runs through Sunday, January 26 at the Community Center gymnasium.

The tournament is an all-Indian competition meaning players are asked to bring their proof of Native American descent. The proof can be an official CIB, or a tribal enrollment card (only if questioned).

Players who can't prove certificate of Indian blood, or official tribal affiliation, will not play, if protested. High school age players are not eligible to participate in this tournament.

The game will be a double-elimination 12 team-18 game bracket.

\$2.5 million for electric vehicle charging stations

The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs will receive more than \$2.5 million to add 18 new electric vehicle charging stations: Ten of the stations will be on the reservation, and eight will be at the Plateau Travel Plaza.

There are also two EV charging ports currently operating at Indian Head Casino, available 24 hours.

Regarding the new stations, the recent investment from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law of 2022 will improve the overall reliability and accessibility of charging infrastructure.

Also notably, every 24 hours on average close to 10,000 vehicles pass through Warm Springs on Highway 26. The new charging stations on the reservation would also add to the EV infrastructure for the tribal community.

"The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs expresses our gratitude for the Federal Highway Administration's award of

\$2.6 million in funds that will allow for the construction and maintenance of electric vehicle charging stations on our lands," said Jonathan Smith Sr., Tribal Council

Chairman.

"We appreciate that this grant supports our sovereign interests by allowing our government to control pricing and benefit from the generated revenue at the charging stations," Chairman Smith said.

"It falls in line with our long-term vision to take care of the Creator's gifts and sustain our way of life, while also helping us to invest in more jobs, housing and infrastructure for our people."

The allocation for the charging stations was sponsored by Oregon's U.S. Senators Ron Wyden and Jeff Merkley.

"Electric vehicles mean cleaner air, healthier communities, and a whole lot less climate pollution, and it's important that tribal communities are not left out of the transition," said Sen. Merkley. Sen. Wyden adds,

"This much-deserved investment in the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs recognizes the important role Tribal communities play in the climate crisis battle and the increasing significance of elec-

tric vehicles to win that fight."

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law established the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure Grant Program at the U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration to deploy EV charging infrastructure and other alternative fueling infrastructure projects in urban and rural communities in publicly accessible locations.

The total allocation to the Warm Springs tribes is \$2,556,496. Additionally in the recent allocations to the region, the Cowlitz Indian Tribe is receiving a federal grant to boost EV charging infrastructure in both Oregon and Washington:

\$15 million for the Cowlitz Indian Tribe's Northwest Tribal Zero Emission Vehicle Charging and Fueling Network to install 172 electric vehicle charging ports across six tribal sites in Oregon and Washington. Each site will also include chargers for e-bikes and e-scooters. Locations are chosen for their strategic importance along key travel corridors in rural and disadvantaged communities.

For the Agency District, with three seats on Council in addition to the Wasco Chief, there are 988 off-reservation voters, and 1,237 on-reservation voters.

For the Simnasho District, with three Council seats and the Warm Springs Chief, there are 544 off-reservation voters and 655 on-reservation voters.

For the Seekseequa District, with two elected representatives in addition to the Paiute Chief, there are 98 off-reservation voters and 176 on-reservation voters.

Election, Counting boards

Tribal Council is now advertising for three positions and one alternate on the Election Board; and four positions and one alternate on the Counting Board.

Tribal members interested in serving on one of these boards, please submit letters of interest and resumes to the tribes’ Secretary-Treasurer/CEO, PO Box 455, Warm Springs, OR 97761. A criminal background check is also required (*see details at right*).

Election Day and before

The Tribal Council Election Day is March 26. The voting place is the Warm Springs Community Center. Some other dates to keep in mind:

Friday, January 24 is the deadline for any new voters to register, or existing voters to change voting districts.

The process for preparing absentee ballots will begin on Monday, January 27, with absentee ballots mailed out on Wednesday, February 12.

Tribal members who request absentee ballots, who have had a change of address, should complete a change of address form.

Controversial biofuel plant at Columbia River has DEQ approval

A controversial plant near Clatskanie along the Columbia River took another step toward construction when the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality approved the facility’s plans to protect water quality in the Columbia and adjacent wetlands.

The plant would produce diesel fuel from used cooking oil, wood waste and other organic byproducts.

The controversial plant is being developed by Houston-based NXCclean Fuels.

Company leaders say the plant will produce an environmentally friendly fuel that will cut carbon emissions by replacing dirtier fossil fuels in trucks and airplanes.

The volume of production—750 million gallons a day—would make the plant the largest producer of renewable diesel in the U.S.

Opponents say the plant will create risks for spills of feedstocks like corn oil and grease as they are brought by rail across silty river bottom land that is vulnerable to shaking during an earthquake.

The plant would also consume fossil fuels to produce its renewable diesel, critics say. Some also say the plant would destroy rich farmland along the Columbia.

NXCclean says the plant will create 3,500 jobs during construction and 240 permanent ones.

Columbia Riverkeeper indicated an appeal can be expected.

The NXCclean plant still needs a federal water permit to be granted through a process overseen by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Describe your priorities for the Confederated Tribes and membership including any issues that need to be addressed.

Ordinance no. 44 states regarding the Election boards:

For each election, the Tribal Council shall appoint an Election board for each polling place, the Election Board to be composed of the following officials: Three members of the Election Board. One alternate member of the Election board...

The Tribal Council will appoint one of the three members as the as the Chairman of the Election Board, and in the event that any of the three members of the Election Board shall be unable to serve or shall resign, then the alternate shall replace any such member.

Counting Board: For each election, the Tribal Council shall appoint a Counting Board for the purpose of counting the results of the elections. The Counting Board shall consist of four persons, and the Tribal Council will appoint one of the four members as Chairman.

All members of the Election and Counting boards shall be members of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs; and shall not be appointed to such positions in an election where they or a member of their immediate family are a candidate for election, or where they may personally have an interest in the election different from the interests of the membership at large.

It shall be the duty of the Election Board to supervise the election at the voting place where they are designated to serve.

The Vital Stats Department Supervisor shall furnish to the Election Board an up to date voter list showing the district in which each of the voters is entitled to vote; and insofar as the Election Board is concerned such voter list shall be final.

It shall be the duty of the Election Board to supervise the election at the voting place where they are designated to serve. The Vital Stats Department Supervisor shall furnish to the Election Board an up to date voter list showing the district in which each of the voters is entitled to vote; and insofar as the Election Board is concerned such voter list shall be final.

The Election Board shall insure that all persons whose names are shown on the voter list shall have an opportunity to vote in the district where they are registered and that no persons whose names are not on the voting list for that district shall vote. Invalids and persons hospitalized or incarcerated and unable to travel to the voting place shall have their ballots collected by a two person team composed of a member of the Election Board and a member of the Counting Board.

Comments on Columbia fish, wildlife

The public has 90 days to send in recommendations for changes to the Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife Program, a 40-year effort to protect and mitigate for the impacts of the hydropower system on salmon and other fish and wildlife in the Columbia River Basin.

The Northwest Power and Conservation Council recently released the request for public input. To learn more and submit a recommendation, go to: nwcouncil.org/amend

The deadline for submissions is April 17. The Power and Conservation Council plans to adopt the updates in spring of 2026.

The Council updates the Fish and Wildlife Program every five years based on recommendations from regional tribes, state and federal agencies, local governments, nonprofits, energy customers, and other interested parties.

Willamette Falls tribal fishing access case going to trial

The federal eminent domain property case between Portland General Electric, the Oregon Department of State Lands and Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde over land historically used by tribes for fishing at Willamette Falls will head to trial later this year. Earlier this month, Judge Michael Simon, for the District of Oregon, denied motions for summary judgment from both the Grand Ronde and PGE. Motions for summary judgment ask a judge to decide a case without going to trial. All sides presented oral arguments related to the motions in court last month, prompting a protest from Grand Ronde tribal members outside the courthouse. PGE wants to condemn land, creating equal access for all traditional tribes to the site; while the Grand Ronde advocates feel this would encroach

on their sovereignty, among its arguments. Other regional tribes including Warm Springs, Siletz, Umatilla and Yakama have backed PGE, saying the power company will restore equitable access to the falls for all tribes. **How the case came about** Though PGE did not file the eminent domain claim in federal court until 2022, the basis of the arguments date back to 2016 when the Grand Ronde sought a special permit from the state of Oregon to build a fishing platform at the base of the falls. In 2018, the Oregon Department of State Lands granted Grand Ronde permission to construct the fishing platform. “Beginning in 2018 and continuing to the present day, other tribes in the area expressed concerns to PGE

about the Platform Registration issued by DSL to Grand Ronde,” Judge Simon wrote as background in his summary judgment decision. “These concerns mainly seek to ensure equal access to the fishing area at the falls for all tribes.” PGE formally contested the state’s decision to permit the fishing platform by requesting a hearing in December 2018.

Mediation of the differences continued for two years without success. In 2021, PGE submitted an application through the Federal Energy Regulation Commission—the body that oversees transmission of energy such as electricity, natural gas and oil—for a perpetual cultural practice easement to allow all federally recognized tribes to fish at the falls. “FERC rejected PGE’s

request, stating that the DSL asserted state ownership of the land over which PGE sought to grant the easement,” according to Simon’s background information. FERC’s denial led PGE to pursue condemnation of about five acres of land at the falls owned by the Department of State Lands, some of which was outside the project boundary of PGE’s hydroelectric facility. **PGE’s safety concerns** In its filing, PGE claims it needs control of the contested five acres to continue operating the hydroelectric facility and that the Grand Ronde fishing platform created “substantial operational and public safety risks.” Grand Ronde contends that PGE failed to express safety concerns in the years prior to its application for the fishing platform, during which tribal members still

fished at the falls. Grand Ronde also asserts that PGE’s primary motivation to condemn the land was to allow other federally recognized tribes to fish at the falls. Grand Ronde also argues PGE has an important business relationship with the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, another reason for its eminent domain argument. PGE argues it did not bring up safety issues previously because they “had not risen to the level that reached operational concerns that required action by PGE” until the state gave Grand Ronde permission to build the platform. The judge’s denial of the summary judgment motions sets the case up for a trial later this year. The next court date scheduled for the case is an April 1 pretrial conference.

Warm Springs Agency Superintendent position open with BIA

The position of Superintendent of the the Bureau of Indian Affairs Warm Springs Agency is advertised by the Department of the Interior, BIA Northwest Region. **Duties** include the following: Responsible for serving as the line official in charge of the daily operations and special projects of Indian Affairs assigned at the Agency that include Indian Trust responsibility, Indian Services and Administration. Development of current and long range plans for executing programs consisting of natural resources, Realty, tribal government, self-determination, environmental, housing improvement, transportation, and forestry and fire. Direct on-going effort to promote the economic, social, educational, and health needs of the Indian people. Meet with the Tribal Council chairman, Tribal Council and boards and

committees for special meetings. Prepare reports relative to the situation of tribes to include socio-economic conditions, status of condition of Indian natural resources, and other similar matters. Direct the planning, coordination, and execution of all activities pertinent to the tenure and management of real estate under the jurisdiction of the Agency. Coordinate requirements under Public Law 93-638, as amended, the Indian Self Determination and Education Assistance Act, and makes recommendations on all grants/contracts applications. Direct preparation, review, and/or approves budgets for use of funds derived from the harvesting of Indian trust forestry products and withdrawal of funds. Serve on the Region-wide team for workforce planning to ensure implementation and execution of daily duties for the Region and Agency, including hiring. Direct the work of

Agency employees of various grades and programs. **Requirements and conditions of employment:** U.S. citizenship required. Indian Preference applies. You will be required to have federal payments made by direct deposit. You may be required to successfully complete a probationary-trial period. A background security investigation will be required for all new hires: Appointment will be subject to the applicant’s successful completion of a background security investigation and favorable adjudication. If you are a male applicant born after December 31, 1959 and are required to register under the Military Selective Service Act, the Defense Authorization Act of 1986 requires that you be registered or you are not eligible for appointment in this agency. Incumbent is required to operate a government motor vehicle, must possess a valid driver’s license, and have a safe driving record within the

four-year period immediately preceding submittal of GSA Form 3607. Will be required to file an OGE-450, Confidential Financial Disclosure Report Form in accordance with 5 CFR Part 2634, Subpart I. **Qualifications, and experience and education requirements:** (OPM Operating Manual, Qualification Standards for Administrative and Management Positions, GS-0340). GS-13: I have at least one year of full-time specialized experience or the equivalent, comparable to at least the GS-12 in the federal service (obtained in either the public or private sector). This experience must include the serving as the line official in charge of daily operations and special projects of an Agency including coordinating various Agency programs; Providing expert counsel to agency management and professionals on a wide variety of social economic and

Warm Springs tribal members also receive 50-percent off cabana rentals, and 25-percent off food purchases. For other tribal members there is 25-percent off the cabana rentals.

Homeless count

The Confederated Tribes’ Health and Human Services branch is hosting the annual Point in Time Count on Tuesday, January 28. This will be an assessment of the tribal homeless situation.

The Health and Human Services team and partners will host the Point in Time from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. January 28 at the old Warm Springs elementary school gymnasium.

Participants can register at 9 a.m This event is for the homeless population. The screening questions and answers will be taken at regis-

tration.

The Point-in-Time counts unsheltered community members who are living in tents, camps, vehicles, RVs with no electrical or water hookups; as well as sheltered members who are in the shelter/transitional homes.

Residents residing in the new Permanent Supportive houses are not considered homeless, as they are now permanently housed.

On the county day, Breakfast will be served at 9 a.m and is sponsored by Health and Human Services. Lunch will begin at 11 a.m. and is sponsored by Indian Head Casino. The Homeless Shelter will not serve breakfast and lunch on this day.

All homeless community members are welcome to share these meals with us throughout the day.

Booths at the Point in Time Count this year include Warm Springs Fire and Safety, Dental and the Pharmacy, Prevention, the Jefferson County Health Department, Neighbor-Impact, Indian Health Services contact representatives, Nursing, Thrive of Central Oregon, and the Oregon Department of Human Services. Limited medical exams will also be available in the Mobile Medical Unit.

Resources provided will be Narcan education and distri-

bution, blood pressure and sugar checks, flu shots and covid boosters, Oregon Health Plan assistance, plus additional information.

The Commodities program will also provide non-perishable foods for participants to choose from.

Incentives will be given to participants who complete their passport and the survey.

All Indian Health Service programs that attend the event and provide services and information. 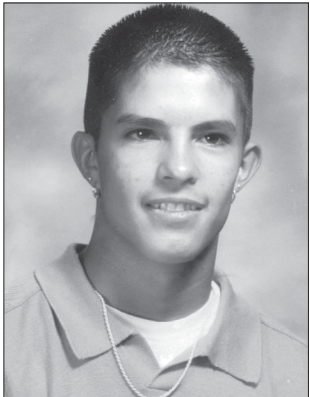

Aquatic Center funding measure on May ballot

As my primary focus is helping the Madras Aquatic Center Recreation District become financially stable, I did some research about how much we support some of our public amenities with our tax dollars.

The Aquatic Center revenue from property taxes is \$750,000 with other revenues from user fees, grants and donations, bringing our total revenue to \$1,261,844.

Operational costs for the district to meet community expectations with hours and programs is \$2,113,000. This would put the Aquatic Center at a deficit of \$851,000 at the end of the year.

There is currently another \$675,000 in property taxes that go to debt service and can only be used to pay off the original building bond, which will be paid off completely in June 2025.

The district is hoping that, with two measures on the May ballot, those funds can be turned into operational funds to help support more hours and long-term maintenance needs at the Aquatic Center.

For a comparison, the library has existed since 1916 and serves most of Jefferson County and some of Wasco, which means they have a larger tax base than the other services.

Their property tax revenue is listed as \$854,000 for 2025, (2024 was less because of the PGE thing) with additional revenues from grants and donations bringing their total revenues to \$2,134,165.

The total expenses for the year are \$1,870,013, which means they end the year with an excess of \$264,152 that they can use in the following year. Their

budget is balanced.

The golf course receives \$1,075,000 from the city of Madras general fund and raises and an additional \$255,350 from membership fees, rental, and food and drink sales.

The parks bureau handles 30 acres of parks, 290 acres of open space within the city limits and 195 acres of open space with public buildings. The proposed budget for 2025 is \$593,000.

If I looked hard enough, I could calculate the cost per person usage, but that is not the idea behind this post.

We all support things we do not use, for the general benefit of the community. How many times do you hear people over 50 say “I don’t have any kids in school. Why should I pay?”

Well, that is not how the system works. Public resources spread the cost of schools, police, fire, courts, parks, libraries, golf courses, swimming pools and bike paths over the lifetime of the taxpayer.

They also create economic prosperity by educating and engaging our future local workforce (and attracting new folks and businesses to the area who will also contribute to our communities).

To understand, just check the per year cost of private schools or private clubs and compare that to your tax bill.

Please consider funding the Madras Aquatic Center Recreation District to the same sustainable level as our other public provided amenities. Vote yes/yes on your May ballot.

Federal approval of new Coquille casino

The new casino, Coquille’s second, will be for class 2 gaming only; governor, senators, some other tribes are opposed

The Department of the Interior last week approved a new tribal casino for the Coquille Indian Tribe. The casino is planned for Medford in southern Oregon. The Coquille Tribe is located 170 miles away in North Bend on the Oregon Coast. Jackson County, however, is one of the five counties in the ‘service area’ of the tribe, as set out in the Coquille Restoration Act of the late 1980s. The

Coquille Tribe also owns and operates the Mill Casino, Hotel and RV park in North Bend. The new Coquille casino will be in a building that the Coquille have owned and operated as a bowling alley. Their application for the Medford casino approval has been pending with the BIA for more than 10 years, and has met with consistent opposition from other tribes of that region. The Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians, Karuk Tribe, and Tolowa Dee-ni’ Nation, for instance, filed a request for the U.S. District Court to issue a temporary restraining order against the

project approval. Oregon Gov. Kotek has also indicated her objection. The process, though, for the Coquille regarding this new casino did not require a state compact, as the proposed gam-

ing will be class 2, like the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs Plateau Travel Plaza gaming room. A proposal for a new class1 casino would require a compact with the state: This was required during the process that Warm Springs pursued regarding the Cascade Locks casino proposal. Oregon Sen. Ron Wyden also indicated his objection to the Coquille approval: “This reckless choice by DC bureaucrats catapults Oregon into an uncontrolled escalation of gambling with no end in sight,” Sen. Wyden said. “And it compounds the collateral damage from this casino arms race by cavalierly tossing out our state’s time-honored agreement that balances all tribes’ equal opportunities to achieve economic independence and prosperity. “I will fight this senseless decision with all the options available, including the Congressional Review Act that empowers elected representatives to battle back against rogue federal agency decisions just like this one.”


